A Letter from the Superintendent, Greg Hughes

One of the most often asked questions of American schools based overseas is, "Just how American are you?"

This is a valid question when you look at the diversity of our school population and the general makeup of our school community. Although we pride ourselves on being truly international, we have a wonderful curriculum that utilizes the best of American educational practice while also incorporating the latest research. We comply to an American set of standards, namely the AERO standards, which are internationally renowned and ensure that our students are typically learning at the same rate as their peers worldwide, and importantly our school is accredited through the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools, an American, accrediting body that works all over the world to ensure that the schools they accredit are meeting the highest standards. In terms of our teaching staff, a very high percentage of our teachers are from the USA and they are not only experienced and well qualified, having studied in American universities, but they are also certified by their respective states to teach their specific subject.

We are strongly affiliated with our friends at the US embassy and their help and support has been invaluable over the years in terms of logistics, but also in terms of the help they give us with security through the office of the Regional Security Officer. The US Ambassador also has a representative from the Embassy who serves on our School Board.

While we revel in the fact that we have this "duality" of being American in nature and at the same being very international, it does pose some logistical problems such as scheduling our School Calendar. If we were to celebrate all of the American holidays as well as the various religious and other holidays celebrated in Sudan we would be missing a large portion of our school year. Halloween is very much a secular event nowadays and really allows people to dress up in costumes and enjoy each other's company in a unique way. Here at KAS we will be following this tradition by encouraging students to get into

What can I do to help my child succeed in school?

- Create a home environment that encourages learning and schoolwork. Establish a daily family routine and set specific time for homework, chores, bedtime, and family activities.
- Show your child that the skills she is learning in school are an important part of the things she will do as an adult. Let her see you reading books, newspapers and computer screens; writing reports, letters, e-mails and lists; using math to figure change or to measure for new carpeting; and doing things that require thought and effort.

- Make sure that your home has lots of reading materials that are appropriate for your child. Keep books, magazines and newspapers in the house. You can find many good books and magazines for your child at yard or library sales. Books make good gifts.
- Encourage your child to use the library. The librarian is willing to help!
- Limit TV viewing to no more than one hour on a school night. Be aware of the shows your child likes to watch and discuss his choices with him. The same goes for video games.
- Help you child to use the Internet properly and effectively.
- Encourage your child to be responsible and to work independently. Taking responsibility and working independently are important qualities for school success.
- Show an interest in what your child does in school. Support his special interests by attending school plays, musical events, science fairs or sporting events.
- Offer praise and encouragement for achievement and improvement.
