How can I encourage my child to read at home?

Helping children become and remain readers is the single most important thing that parents and families can do to help their children succeed in school and in life.

- Read aloud to your child often. Start reading to you child when she is a baby and keep reading as they grow up. As you read, talk with your child. Encourage her to ask questions and talk about the story. Ask her to predict what will come next.
- Encourage your child to read on her own. Children who spend at least 30 minutes a day reading for fun develop the skills to be better readers at school.
- Set aside a quiet time for family reading. Some families even enjoy reading aloud to each other, with each family member choosing a book, story, poem or article to read to the others.
- Visit the library often. Begin making weekly trips to the library when your child is very young. See that your child gets her own library card as soon as possible.
- Buy a children's dictionary and start the "let's look it up" habit.
- Make writing materials, such as crayons, pencils and paper, available.

- Ask family members and friends to consider giving your child books and magazine subscriptions as gifts for birthdays or other special occasions. Set aside a special place for your child to keep her own library books.
- Get help for your child if she has a reading problem. If you think that your child needs extra help, ask her teachers about the Learning Center.
- If you are uncomfortable with your reading ability, look for family or adult reading programs in your community. Friends and relatives also can read to your child!

Keep active over the break

Don't turn into a couch potato while you are away from school. Get out and do something each day for at least 30 minutes. Below are some ideas to keep active and fit over the break:

Take a walk, play with friends, go swimming, surprise your parents and do house or yard work, ride a bike, dance around your room, do body weight exercises learned from PE, stretch, run around the house, or whatever you like to get you moving each day and have **Fun!** See you next year!
