Twelve KAS students spent this past weekend participating in a Model United Nations conference hosted by KICS. Delegates at the conference researched and debated three major issues: disarmament in Israel and the DPR Korea, women's rights in Afghanistan, and corporate social responsibility. At the opening ceremony, Almaha al-Hammadi, representing the IAEA, and Sammy Hassan, representing South Korea, delivered strong position statements on the issue of nuclear disarmament, while Hayam Elsanousi, the delegate of the United States, focused attention on the issue of corporate social responsibility. During debate sessions, Hasan Babiker and Hayam Elsanousi both submitted strong resolutions that were passed by the Human Rights Council, and all the delegates were actively involved in trying to come up with potential solutions for the issues. In addition to the already mentioned students, KAS was represented by Saba Khan, Nthabiseng Kgwete, Andrew Kim, Sarah Saif Omer, Leticia Pereira, Bethel Tafere, and Mengfei Wang. Great work KAS!

Get Organized!

As you can see by reading this week's newsletter, KAS has successful Community Service and Model United Nations programs. In addition to these programs, we provide our students with numerous after school activities. It is important



for our students to have extracurricular opportunities, as it leads to their growth as community members, team players, artists, athletes and public speakers.
