Dear Parents,

The Science Fair yesterday evening was nothing short of fantastic! I am sure that everyone who came along will agree that the effort and enthusiasm of all participants was the true highlight of the event. From the feedback I received from parents in attendance many were in awe of the engagement of the students in their projects while others marveled at the scope of the different experiments on offer.

While kudos goes out to our students and their teachers, a special mention goes to Mr. Paar who really excelled in putting together a program that enthralled everyone. When you plan events such as this you are never sure whether something may go astray somewhere along the way, but the students made sure that they played their part to perfection, and once more did our school proud.

The key point that struck me was the philosophy behind the event. At KAS we often talk about our discovery based program and the Science Fair, more than any other event in the school, typifies this concept of inquiry based learning. In this method of learning, students are asked to challenge themselves with a problem of interest and then by appealing to their own sense of curiosity they are able to formulate their own strategies and plans for the development of their projects while learning through a process of discovery. For many of us brought up on heavy doses of rote learning where the teacher always knew best, and learning never really involved input from the learner, this modern style of teaching is truly a breath of fresh air.

The other interesting point that struck me was the willingness of our students to open up, and to display the confidence required to present their material to their parents, teachers and in some cases strangers. In particular our ESL students did an amazing job not only explaining their projects, but also tackling the difficult terminology that is part of Science.

It seems like every week there is always something amazing taking place at KAS, and without doubt this week has been no exception.

During the Khartoum American School Open Day, yesterday, our senior students and the Community Service Learning class students welcomed our guests and gave them a tour of our beautiful campus.



Descriptive words (1st Grade)

In Grade 1, we have been exploring descriptive words. Descriptive words are "size, shape" (Adam), "colors" (Aayaan), "smell and look" (Ben). They are also "long and short, big and tall, how many" (Grade 1). Descriptive words tell about something. We practiced using descriptive words to tell about a troll after we read The Three Billy Goats Gruff. We named our troll and then drew a picture to go along with our descriptions.We also wrote our own short stories using descriptive words. First, we brainstormed things to write about. We chose an animal or a topic and then started writing. We worked with Ms. Fredericks to revise our stories and then we re-wrote them.We illustrated pictures to go with our stories and shared them with the class.
