A message from the Learning Center

Attention parents! Would you like some reading strategies to help your students complete their homework?

If your student is reading a fictional story book or novel:

- Ask them to make predictions about upcoming passages and chapters.
- Help them figure out new vocabulary by asking them to look at the context of the sentence.
- If students still need help with definitions, help them locate a dictionary.
- Help them imagine they are a part of the story by encouraging their opinions about characters and events.

Students who are reading passages in history text books can use similar strategies.

- Discuss the importance of analyzing titles and headings. They provide summaries of the upcoming information, and will give students a strong grasp of the main points of each paragraph.
- Encourage students to read and understand these headings, before they begin reading the text.
- Students should read through the passages, and locate difficult or new terms. Help students to define these terms, and then reread the text to enhance understanding.
- Students may be assigned comprehension questions by their teacher. Make sure that students read these questions before they read the text. Students will be able to focus on the information better, if they know what information they are expected to remember. **Happy reading!**


