


Why Ask Why??

Grade 5 students have been learning to use

comprehension strategies to better understand what they read. Right now, they're focusing on "questioning." When readers ask questions about texts, they may not realize it, but they're actually showing what it is they do understand and helping themselves to think more deeply. Some questions that readers ask about texts require higher levels of thinking than others. The deeper the questions we ask, the deeper our thinking and understanding is about what we read. Eventually, successful readers learn to ask questions naturally as they read; at this stage, we are practicing this skill (both orally and in writing) so we can someday reach that goal. There are four types of questions we can ask about what we read, ranging from lower-level thinking to higher-level thinking questions: Right There, Think & Search, Author & Me, and On My Own. The students

have been using QAR Bookmarks to assist them in identifying and asking certain types of questions about their reading.





The Water You Drink: A Trip to Safia Plant

On Monday, October 17, 2011, the Environmental Science class took a field trip to the DAL Group Company located in the industrial area of Khartoum North. The objective of the trip was to gain insight about bottled water purification at one of the water companies in Sudan.

On our trip, we learned that the DAL group uses an extensive process to purify the raw water. The company uses four deep wells as a source instead of the Nile River. Water from the Nile is considered too expensive to treat as it is too turbid. First, water is stored in a large tank and then chlorinated. The water is then put through a sand filter to remove foreign bodies. The next step is using carbon filters to remove the chlorine and bad odors. Followed by Reverse Osmosis which is the latest technology used by the company to remove salt and other minerals. Finally, the water is treated by Ozone (03) to kill germs and make it safe for drinking.

The Environmental Class was amazed by how the quality control was highly proficient and the system was extremely developed.

Learning Center Corner

At the Learning Center you will often hear us encouraging students to read daily. Many of you parents have been encouraged by us, as well, to read daily with your children. I'm sure everyone has heard from a teacher at some point in his or her life how important it is to read. When we read, we often come across unfamiliar words. One of the skills we develop by reading regularly is the problem solving skill of using context clues to figure out what an unfamiliar word could mean. The more we do this, the more we develop the strength of our brains. The more we read and learn unfamiliar words, the larger our vocabulary becomes the and the easier reading and writing become, therefore raising school performance.

At www.fcrr.org/curriculum/PDF/G4-5/45VPartFour.pdf you will find a very long document about reading and vocabulary, but if you skip down to page 40, you will find a page that can be printed, cut out, folded and reinforced, to make it into a bookmark. This can then mark the page in the book you are reading at home alone or together with a family member. It explains how to use context clues to understand unfamiliar words. READ, READ, READ! It's worth it!
