Letter from the Superintendent, Greg Hughes

Dear Parents,

This week, we welcomed back our Model United Nations (MUN) students from their trip to the Singapore Model United Nations Conference. This trip is becoming a regular journey for many of our senior students who take part in this annual conference which is run by The Hague Model United Nations (THIMUN). It is one of the most prestigious conference worldwide and of the 70 or more schools which attended, Khartoum American School is the only African school to attend.

The Model United Nations program is a simulation of the United Nations and it allows students from all over the world to participate in their own diplomatic world. As with the actual United Nations, there is a set protocol which must be observed and students are required to demonstrate knowledge, presentation skills, and the confidence to address hundreds of people.

This year our delegates represented the nations of Senegal and Australia, and were challenged to address a number of resolutions relating to a multitude of topics including ecotourism, cultural literacy, the rights of migrant workers, and chemical weapons.

Beyond researching the nature of these topics, it is also essential for delegates to understand the country to which they are assigned and to then address these from that country's perspective. This dual challenge is definitely formidable but year after year our students excel on all fronts.

An event such as this requires the hard work behind the scenes and for that we are thankful to Ms. Wilson for all of her hard work and effort in bringing the trip to fruition and also to Mr. Kessler for helping chaperone and support the group. Our MUN students were a true credit to our school, and as a community we thank them also for representing our school in such a dignified way. Of course, there were also a few small opportunities to see Singapore and I am sure that our students took full advantage of these.

At Khartoum American School, we believe strongly in providing a holistic program for all of our students and the MUN is just another way in which students can express themselves beyond their regular academic program. It is my hope that this wonderful tradition continues for many years to come and KAS students continue to reap the rewards that MUN has to offer, as much as the Singapore MUN conference benefits from our students' outstanding participation.

Model United Nations (MUN) is a program that simulates the decision-making processes of the United Nations by actively involving students in researching major world issues, creating resolutions, and debating policy and possible courses of action.

From November 13-20, 15 KAS students traveled to Singapore to participate in the seventh annual THIMUN Singapore conference, one of the most prestigious MUN conferences in the world. Along with over 1300 students from schools around the globe, the KAS students spent four days discussing and analyzing current world issues ranging from the growing world drug problem to the treatment and exploitation of migrant workers.

This was KAS's third year participating in the conference, and once again, the KAS team members definitely made their presence known. Ambassadors Mustafa Elamin, representing Senegal, and Mengfei Wang, representing Australia, delivered excellent speeches to the General Assembly, and all members of the KAS delegation were active and critical participants within their forums, giving strong speeches and asking pointed questions. The students put considerable time and effort into preparing for the conference, and their hard work clearly paid off.

Due to such success, we have decided to take mentoring one step further by starting a mentoring program based on both academic and social relationships among older and younger students. This program, the Actions Speak Mentoring Program, takes advantage of the wide range of ages and life experiences at KAS by fostering trustworthy relationships.

We believe that the children selected for this program (whether as mentees or mentors) will have enriched experiences at school through the relationships they will form with their peers. Not only will mentees have the opportunity to look up to a role model within the school, but the extracurricular activities of them and their mentors will be expanded upon; mentors will plan activities (once per week) for themselves and their mentees to take part in outside of class time, such as studying and playing sports. One of the activities out of each month will require the mentors to plan more, catering to the interests of the mentees. All Action Speaks Mentoring Program participants have the potential to greatly benefit in some way.
