Midterm Examinations

Midterm Examinations will be this coming week for our high school students. This is an important weekend. Plan to set aside several hours each day for study. Try not to cram it all in to one study session. This evening, go home and plan your weekend. Perhaps you will take this evening off, and do your socializing now, so that tomorrow (Friday) you can stick to a study schedule. Plan 20 to 60 minute study blocks, according to your capacity to work and retain information. Work in a quiet, interruption, electronic and music, free place. Work through the excellent study guides your teachers have given you. If you plan to study from 9:00-10:00 AM and then take a break from 10:00 to 10:30, be sure to reward yourself if you worked well during your first hour. Grab a healthy snack (sugar free - to keep your brain at optimum performance), drink some water, watch a short TV show, call a friend, something that will relax you, then get back to your quiet desk for your next hour of study, and so on.

Make sure to get lots of sleep this weekend. You will not be able to remember what you have studied if you are too tired. You will perform poorly on the exam if you are too tired or stressed.

On exam day, be sure to be at school early. Make sure you come prepared. Bring pencils, pens, sharpeners, erasers, rulers and your calculator, and whatever else your teacher may require (i.e. a completed study guide). Listen to the teacher instructions carefully. Before you begin writing the test, take several deep breaths, and picture yourself doing well on the exam. When you begin, slowly and carefully read through the entire exam first. Go back and start by answering the questions you know you will answer well. If a question is confusing you, or taking too long, or difficult, mark it with a star and move on. At the end you can go back and look for the stars and continue working on them.
