Space Explorers

KAS Grade 5 students are becoming space experts!

They have been learning about our solar system in Discovery. The unit will continue to focus on the movement of and relationship between the Earth, Moon, and Sun and will also include the gathering of research about the planets within our solar system. The class will complete a one-month "moon calendar," showing the phases of the moon throughout a lunar cycle. They will also build a



model that demonstrates the phases of the Moon. Throughout, each student will be researching one of the planets in our solar system. In Writing, the students have been studying the multi-paragraph essay format. They compared the format of multi-paragraph writing to the format the class wrote in all through the first semester, the long paragraph expository format.

Multi-paragraph essays are basically s-t-re-t-c-h-e-d out long paragraphs, with many more details and much more information included. Following a whole-class write, providing practice and an example for future reference, Grade 5 will begin using the research they collected about their planet to write a five-paragraph essay. Each student's essay will highlight the meaning behind the name of their planet, its comparison with Earth, and other interesting/fun facts about it. Grade 5 students will demonstrate all their knowledge of our solar system by using technology. More specifically, they will create a video scrapbook with the iMovie program; each student's video will catalogue their learning experience during these overlapping, integrated units, from beginning to end.

Look out, space programs of the world...these kids may be headed your way!


