Once again thank you and have a safe weekend.


Letter From the Middle and High School Principal Susan Boutros


















A short history of Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day is a worldwide phenomenon celebrated in many parts of the world. It is commonly associated with romantic love. Nowadays it can be a celebration of general love, love for one's family, mother, father and even friends. Surprisingly, Saint Valentine's Day or simply Valentine's which is celebrated on February 14 was first observed to commemorate a group of early Christian martyrs named Saint Valentine and had absolutely nothing to do with love as we know it today. It was first established around 4.95 C.E. by the Roman Catholic Church and then removed as a date in the Catholic Church's calendar in 1363. The first link Valentine's Day had with romance and love as we know it came in the Late Middle Ages and this developed through the tradition of Courtly Love during the Renaissance. This slowly evolved into an occasion in which lovers expressed their undying love for each other by giving candies and greeting cards. However, it wasn't until the 19th century that Valentine's Day really took off as a commercial enterprise. Paper Valentines became so popular in England in the early 19th century that they were assembled in factories. Fancy Valentines were made with real lace and ribbons, with paper lace introduced in the mid-19th century. In the UK today, just under half the population spend money on their Valentines and around 1.3 billion pounds are spent yearly on cards, flowers, chocolates and other gifts, with an estimated 25 million cards being sent. In the United States, the first mass-produced valentines of embossed paper lace were produced and sold around 1847.

Bookmaking is the most popular activity in Kindergarten. One way to get children interested in learning to read is making books. It helps children recognize that writing is "talk written down." Children who are encouraged to draw, scribble, dictate and write stories are building the foundation for later writing skills.


They learn to think of an idea and select topics to write about. They also learn and practice what writers do. They use their creativity, experiences, writing skills, language and imaginations.

The middle school student-led conferences will be held on March 14th. Please choose your preferred time frame to attend in 3 easy steps:


- log-on to your child's KAS moodle

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
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
