One –To-One Laptop Program - Frequently Asked Questions (Part 1)

What is the one-to-one laptop program?

The one-to-one laptop program is an initiative of the school whereby all students from Grades 3 – 12 will be issued a laptop computer at the start of the school year that will used throughout their classes, at break times and can even be taken home for educational use after school, on weekends and holidays.

How will my child benefit from this program?

All students in these grades will be given the opportunity to learn valuable technology skills, and be able to connect to the World Wide Web in all of their classes without having to access computers in our library or computer labs. In essence, their access to educational resources will be limitless. By making computer use an everyday part of school life, students will develop the confidence and expertise required to be tech savvy global citizens, while all the time maintaining the valuable social development and character building programs that KAS is famous for.

Who will own the laptop?

Each student will receive a laptop which they will be responsible for in terms of appropriate usage and care. Each laptop will remain the property of the school while students are enrolled at KAS. However, once the student leaves KAS, ownership of the laptop will be transferred to them and they are free to take this with them.

What steps are being taken to make sure this program is successful?

KAS's has taken numerous steps to ensure that this program is successful. Upgrades are underway in terms of increasing our bandwidth, our network infrastructure and our technical support. Additionally teacher training is underway and steps have been made to increase our access to web based learning. Lessons learned from our pilot program this year with the Grade 9 class have also made us appreciate some of the finer points of running this program and we are confident that we can now conquer all of the small obstacles that we faced. On April 29, the school will also be having a Professional Development Day that will focus exclusively on technology, thus allowing our teachers further training in the use of computers in the classroom.

Loving Literature Circles

The Grade 5 students at KAS have been practicing the Literature Circle format in Reading.

A Literature Circle is basically the same thing as a book club for adults. Students are given choices (i.e. books they will read and jobs they will complete as they read) which contribute to the investments that they have in their own learning, as well as their levels of engagement. The teacher serves as a facilitator, observer, listener, and sometimes fellow reader alongside the students. Through Literature Circles, an environment/structure that allows students to practice and develop the skills and strategies of successful readers is created.

Students are placed strategically in flexible small groups. Each group reads a different book that was decided upon through book preview discussion (from a number of appropriate choices provided by the teacher). After they have been assigned a particular section of the book they chose, they decide who will complete which jobs while reading that section. The jobs are then completed independently. Students who finish their jobs before the rest of their group has completed theirs move on to other forms of reading response (including extension activities or "May Dos").

When everyone has finished their jobs, the group comes together again to have a discussion. During the discussion, the students in the group share the responses they came up with while completing their jobs and conversation flows naturally from there. Grade 5 students peer-grade each other's responses as they are shared (on whether the response showed a Shallow, Middle, or Deep level of thinking). This process repeats, with alternating job assignments, until the book is completed. Literature Circles help to cultivate a love of reading in

children that will ideally carry into their futures, making

them life-long readers.

Your job is to develop a list of questions that your group might want to discuss about this part of the book and direct the discussion by asking each member for their input based on their current role. Don't worry about the small details; your task is to help people talk over the "big ideas" in the reading and share their reactions. Usually the best discussion questions come from your own

Literary Luminary

Your job is to locate a few special sections of the text that you think your group would like to read aloud. Choose passages that will help people remember some interesting, powerful, funny, puzzling, or important sections of the text.

You decide which pages or paragraphs are worth hearing, and then jot plans for how they should be shared. You can read the passages aloud yourself, or ask someone else to read them then discuss them as a group.

Vocabulary Enricher

Your job is to find at least 2 new words from your reading assignment. You will look up the definition of each word and teach the words to your team.

To do this you will read the sentence from the book and share the meaning of the word. Then, everyone will write the words and meanings in their journals or on their worksheets.

Connector -

Your job is to connect the contents of the reading selection to current or past real world events and experiences.

You will also connect the reading to other forms of literature, music, art and/or media.

Travel Tracker

In a book where characters move around a lot and the scenes change frequently, it is important for everyone in your group to know where things are happening and how the setting may have changed. Even if the scenery doesn't change much, the setting is still a very important part of the story.

Your job is to track where the action takes place. Describe each setting in detail, either in words or with a picture map that you can show and discuss with your group. Be sure to give the page numbers.

Tips to Keep Your Kids Fit and Healthy

While advances in medicine and general knowledge continue to improve our quality and length of life, major health issues continue to plague us. Today, the major health threats are not because of external enemies but result from of our personal choices regarding nutrition and daily lifestyle. The followings are some recommendations to promote a healthy lifestyle for your children.

- Share a family meal together: Encourage kids to eat fruits, vegetables, fibers and other healthy foods, by modeling this behavior throughout the day and at the family meal.
- Make favorite dishes healthier. Try to prepare the food with less butter, sugar and other processed ingredients.
- Offer treats in moderation. Ice cream, cake, candy, and cookies should be limited to special occasions like birthday parties, holidays, amusement park trips, and other infrequent occurrences or celebrations.
 As alternatives, keep plenty of fruits like apples, bananas, grapes, and berries washed and easily accessible.
- Pack a lunch. Let your child help plan his or her weekly school lunch.
 Not only will you likely save money, the meal will be healthier,
 too. Some good options include cheese in a whole-wheat pita with
 cucumbers, yogurt, homemade soups in a thermos, hard-boiled eggs,
 apples, nuts, carrots and so on.
- Encourage your children to practice physical exercise. Try to play soccer, swim, bike or participate in other fun sports activities together. Exercises aids metabolism, tones muscle, and reduces stress.
- Set a good example. Your kids watch what you do.
