


Elementary ESL

Earth day trip to the US Embassy



On Sunday, April 22, we the Environmental Science class of 2012, attended a conference at the US Embassy to discuss Earth Day and to inform others about what KAS is doing

to make Khartoum greener and cleaner. The theme for this year's Earth Day was Green Technology, the staff at the US Embassy told visitors about all the ways their new state of the art building is embracing "Green technology." We were also learned about other things being done by other organizations such as the DAL group who are looking to recycle plastic bottles in Khartoum. KAS students also presented KAS's green initiative to the audience at the conference. We described how KAS has planted 2,000 trees in Sudan. We also spoke about the Nile clean-up project and where trash was removed from the river banks of the Nile. Overall, the experience was enlightening and highlighted all the different things people are doing all over Sudan to become Eco-Friendly.



This past weekend, 22 high school students participated in the school's fourth annual Model United Nations conference. Model United Nations (MUN) is a program that simulates the decision-making processes of the United Nations by actively involving students in researching major world issues, creating resolutions, and debating policy and possible courses of action. This year's conference focused on two topics: resolving the conflict between Iran and Israel, and government reform and recovery following the Arab Spring.

The conference began with a wonderful opening ceremony on Thursday night, where all the delegates gave short speeches explaining their country's position on the issues. The students then spent Friday and Saturday in active debate, trying to create solutions and strategies to solve the two main issues. Although finding reasonable solutions was a difficult task, the debate was lively and entertaining, and the students worked hard.


