Today many Americans all around the world are celebrating a very special day-Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving is celebrated each year on the fourth Thursday of November in the United States. Thanksgiving Day is traditionally a day for families and friends to get together for a special meal. The meal usually includes a turkey, stuffing, potatoes, cranberry sauce, gravy, pumpkin pie, and vegetables. Thanksgiving Day parades are held in some cities and towns on or around Thanksgiving Day. This is one of the busiest periods for travel in the USA. Some people have a four-day weekend so it is a popular time for trips and to visit family and friends.

Many people trace the origins of the modern Thanksgiving Day to the harvest celebration that the Pilgrims held in Plymouth, Massachusetts in 1621. However, their first true thanksgiving was in 1623, when they gave thanks for rain that ended a drought. These early thanksgivings took the form of a special church service, rather than a feast. In the second half of the 1600s, thanksgiving after the harvest became more common and started to become an annual event. George Washington, the first president of the United States, proclaimed the first national Thanksgiving Day in 1789.

Thanksgiving Day is a time for many people to give thanks for what they have. Here, at Khartoum American School, we have many things to be thankful for. WRITING WITH ADJECTIVES!

Students in grade 5 are having fun with adjectives!

We started the year reading a book called The Iron Giant. We looked at the main elements of the story, which included plenty of adjectives. Students soon came to realize what makes a book interesting is the powerful descriptive

language and detail. Our classroom quickly filled up with posters illustrating descriptive words. Then, twelve words were chosen for our W.O.W words, "The Word of the Week." Each week we find the definition, syllables, synonyms, and antonyms for a W.O.W word and write a descriptive paragraph. We illustrate our paragraph by drawing a picture emphasizing the "Word of the Week."

Illustrations help students to bring out their creative imagination in expressing details about the setting, characters and plot. Along with writing paragraphs, grade 5 has written "Adjective Poems," and has been working on a project with the art class. We are writing a friendly letter to send off with our art work, to establish pen pals with students at a school in Pennsylvania, USA. Our descriptive five paragraph essay which is still in progress now has a better chance of getting published since grade 5 has their one-on-one laptops. This year has been very busy with writing, but a lot of fun since we have been using adjectives!
