Dear Parents,

As the weekend approaches my newsletter article comes from Johannesburg, South Africa where I start the first leg of the recruitment fair season as we look for outstanding teachers to come and join our returning staff for the 2013/2014 school year. For those of you who are unaware of the process each year teacher recruitment fairs are set up worldwide, exclusively for international schools so that existing teachers working abroad can look for new schools once they have decided to move on, or alternatively teachers new to international schools can make their foray into this exciting part of global education.

These fairs are often located in far flung places and it is a challenge each year to select the fair that would have the most suitable candidates. Last year's outstanding crew of teachers were predominately hired in Johannesburg, Sydney and Bangkok, and I am sure that based on their successful transition into our community we will be returning to these fairs in the future. Johannesburg has a distinct appeal as it attracts teachers who are excited about working in Africa and are prepared for the roller coaster of thrills and challenges that the continent inevitably throws forward.

The majority of my recruitment season, however, will be spent in the US where we hope to sign on some outstanding North American teachers to move our program even further ahead while also giving our fantastic little American school that distinct American flavor. Only this week we hired our first recruit of the season an extremely talented young lady who hails from George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia. My recruitment trail this year will take me to Toronto in Canada, Waterloo in Iowa, San Marcos in Texas and finally San Francisco in California in my pursuit of the right combination of teachers to cover our vacant positions.

Last year on my travels, I had a conversation with one of the most experienced Superintendents on the African continent and his feelings on recruitment were succinct and simple; the recruitment of teachers far outweighs any other duty of an administrator in terms of its importance to a school community, to which I naturally and succinctly agreed.

So on that note please wish me luck in finding the right candidates, as I in turn wish you all once more a peaceful and happy weekend.


Learning Center Corner
