What's up in Music?

It has been an exciting 2 weeks since the International Dinner and Talent Show. The students are back in their regular routine of learning to read notes, identifying music symbols, defining musical terms, conducting research and developing techniques in chorus. Over these past two weeks, the music room was filled with nice singing from the students learning a repertoire for Christmas. Their favorite song is Jingle Bells.



The first grade, second grade and third grade music classes are learning partner songs. They have been practicing how to sing independently their assigned parts. Kindergarten class understands that another name for shakers is maracas. The kindergarten has also started playing patterns to accompany a Spanish Christmas song, also in our repertoire. They are enjoying this part of the lesson very much.



Fourth graders continue to learn more notes to play the recorder. They are now able to play C and D. This completes the C scale and their techniques are consistently improving. Fifth graders are enjoying discussing African music in class. They are so engaged and the discussion is very lively because everybody has some information to share. Physics class

Physics class Students in Mr. Don's Grade 12 Physics class recently designed and conducted an experiment to investigate the motion of a pendulum. They used one smartphone as a timer, and another as a video camera to capture the motion of the pendulum. Students then loaded the video clips onto their laptop computers, and performed a stop-motion analysis to determine the maximum velocity of the pendulum. They then compared the velocity to that predicted by using the formulas for kinetic energy and gravitational potential energy, and found that their results were very close to the predicted values.

Throughout the experiment, students worked together to overcome difficulties. They had to adjust their experimental

setup in order to properly record the time and position of the pendulum, and to analyze the videos. Students learned a great deal about experimental design and control of variables.




Trip to Meroe
