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## Letter from the Superintendent Greg Hughes

Dear Parents,

It was wonderful to hear from Ms. Bhuyan, our High School Social Studies teacher, this week regarding a group of students who traveled to meet with one of the countries' well-known politicians, Mr. Sadiq al-Mahdi. Mr. al-Mahdi served two terms as the democratically elected Prime Minister of Sudan and as such is well qualified to comment on the recent history of the country as well as its current state of affairs.

During their visit Mr. al-Mahdi spoke on a range of topics and enthralled our students with an insider's perception of Sudan, its triumphs and challenges. It is not too common for a group of students to have access with someone of Mr. al-Mahdi's stature and from all accounts they were amazed by his in-depth understanding of politics in Sudan, and his ability to place current issues in Sudan within a historical context. Like most politicians, Mr. al-Mahdi was a wonderful speaker who managed to captivate his audience on a range of issues.

Beyond his impressive resume as a politician, people aware of Sudanese history will know that Mr. al-Mahdi is also the great grandson of the famous Mahdi (Muhammad Ahmad bin Abd Allah), who was responsible for the taking of Khartoum from the British and Turco-Egyptians in 1885. The British led by General Gordon were no match for the Mahdi's forces and the "Battle of Khartoum" was a monumental part of Sudanese history and was a significant step towards Sudan gaining independence.

In last week's newsletter I spoke of the need for our students to come away from their time at Khartoum American School with a deeper appreciation of this wonderful country and this week's field trip was just another example of how we work towards reaching this goal.

KAS teachers strive to plan authentic learning experiences for our students. Real world application brings learning to life. The upper elementary is finishing up an ancient civilizations unit and heading to the National Museum. Connections like this make learning go deep.

All of this is by design, our teachers plan and plan and plan. They look for experiences that will provide evidence of higher order thinking, stimulate real and substantive conversations, personalize learning, and integrate 21 st century skills. Instructional strategies vary and student autonomy, mastery, purpose, choice, and self-direction are valued. This helps student own the learning. Our teachers plan so they can be on the sidelines and not at the front of the classroom lecturing but rather guiding, facilitating, and supporting learning.


Cool experiences are happening everywhere! Grade 3 has a class monetary system in place. Complete with earning change, exchanging dollars, filling out a deposit
slips, banking, and of course spending it in the class store. When I talked to Mohanad, he showed me his deposit slips. He is saving for a "big ticket" item.

## The Science of Nature



When most people see a spider, scorpion, or snake, their instinct is to swat it or flee the area. The six graders however, learned are keenly aware that most insects and small animals have useful purposes as well as how to give simple hints to survive or avoid any threat. They learned how to predict the native insects and animals in the area where they live and what services do those insects and small animals offer. Some of them are harmful as well as predator insects. Predator insects eat prey insects that host on crops, saving farmers huge losses. The dung beetle for instance, which feasts upon cow patties, keeps flies and parasites away from cow waste. They work to fertilize the pasture by decomposing bovine waste. Insects also serve wildlife. Without insects, birds wouldn't exist. Most birds feed upon a variety of bugs

Harmful insects are insects that are harmful in any way to plants, animals or humans. There are many ways in which insects can be harmful to the above; insects such as locusts can form huge swarms that can destroy whole crops in minutes. Scorpions could kill in less than ten minutes and other insects can pierce a leaf or stem of a plant and suck out its juices, leaving the plant to wither and die. Various types of insect and small animal carry diseases such as malaria and encephalitis, which leave many children in developing
