Responsibility

A student's development at school is often linked to the amount of responsibility he or she is given at home. In the nanny culture that we live in, it is so easy to miss opportunities for teaching responsibility. From the time our children can walk, they should be learning to put their own shoes on and to take them off. Of course they need assistance, but their hands and eyes should be as much a part of the process as those of the caregiver. Cleaning and dressing our children should be a parent chore, as cleaning and dressing are very intimate behaviors. These are the times when precious memories are built, important conversations are had, and responsibility can be learned, we should try not to lose these moments to a nanny.

By the time our children are three years old, they should be dressing themselves. Of course they will need help picking out matching outfits, and they might need help with finishing touches, but giving them the autonomy to choose their clothes and to dress themselves is very empowering and teaches our children to take care of themselves rather than wait to be taken care of. When they take too long and we hurry up and dress them ourselves so we can get out the door, we teach our children that if they take their time fulfilling their duties, we'll do the work for them – not a lesson we want to teach.

At this age our children should also have a say in what they eat. Given two healthy choices of food, they can decide – "Would you like apple or orange for snack?"

What we feed our children is very important. Their diets need protein, and healthy fats – from dairy products, meat, fish, beans and vegetables. They also need lots of vitamins and minerals from fruit and vegetables and beans. Cereals, rice and bread are also necessary but should come second to the other foods.

While we provide the healthy foods, our children must be feeding themselves. We must set specific eating times and spaces and certain behaviors must be expected. Sitting at the table for the duration of the meal or snack, chewing and swallowing carefully, paying attention to the eating process not to a television or too much talk should be among the expectations.

Most of all, we must lead by example. We must dress, eat, and talk with our children daily. We should talk about our responsibilities and theirs. We should all hold each other accountable to our responsibilities. These skills spill over into all aspects of life. The ability to interact well with others starts here. The ability to function in a classroom also starts here.
