This year, one of the goals that we have set in Grade 4 is to become more fluent readers.

What does fluency mean?

Fluency is the ability to read smoothly and automatically, with expression and attention to punctuation.

Why is fluency important?

Fluency is directly related to: reading comprehension, independent reading, and work completion. Fluent readers recognize words automatically, group words together quickly, do not have to concentrate on decoding the words, give their attention to comprehension, and recognize words and comprehend at the same time.

One way we are reaching this goal is through timed, repeated reading. Everyday after lunch we use a program called:

The Six Minute Solution.

Just like the name says, it only takes six minutes to do, and we get to see our improvement each week because we graph our results every time we read.



The Six Minute Solution Format:

Minute 1: Students get organized with materials needed

Minute 2: Students silent read their passages

Minute 3: Students mumble read their passages

Minute 4: First timed read. Partner 1 reads, while Partner 2 marks. Partners calculate correct words per minute, and graph results

Minute 5: Repeat steps (partners switch roles)

Minute 6: Clean up



Outside of reading this article, the best way to maintain healthy use of technology in a family is for parents to model healthy use. If there are rules to be followed, then parents ought to model this.

Here are just a few suggestions:

- If family members are having a conversation or sitting together and someone receives a message or call that they feel they must read or take, they should excuse themselves first.
- If it is a text message that was received and responded to, have the courtesy to share with the people you are with a little bit about the message. "I just received an invitation to dinner Friday. I messaged back that we'd be there."
- Use phones, computers, televisions, etc. outside of bedrooms. Keep bedrooms technology free.
- Set a time after which all technology is turned off. For
- example no technology after 9 pm. Or stagger the times.
 No computers after 8, no televisions after 9, etc.
