It gave me great pleasure to witness two wonderful events. The first was a good old-fashioned birthday party with an aquatic twist. Two of our families took advantage of our wonderful facilities by hosting their children's birthday parties in the swimming pool area. Needless to say, the pool was full of happy children along with all the regalia associated with a birthday party. The families and children had a great time but more importantly it allowed the children to use our pool and to enjoy a long, hot afternoon splashing around in the water with their friends.

The second was a wonderful surprise, in that one of the gardeners had taken on the responsibility of taking care of five injured birds that were in need of medical treatment and nourishment. One of our greenhouses has been transformed into a makeshift aviary, consisting of an assortment of kites, eagles, and hawks. Sudan is home to many glorious birds of prey, 61 species in fact, and several of these follow migratory paths as they travel across the African continent. By the time this newsletter is printed we hope that they will have fully recovered and been released back into the wild, but for now our guests are happy recuperating and readying themselves for life outside.

# **Differentiated Instruction**

There's lots of talk around KAS about differentiated instruction. For families who are new to our school this might be a strange term. According to the New Brunswick board of education, in a "Differentiated Curriculum the content, process and/or product of the prescribed curriculum are modified to accommodate variations in students' learning styles, preferences, characteristics, multiple intelligences, talents, strengths and needs. A critical step in the development of differentiation is the identification of the underlying concepts to be taught." This brings up another term heard often at KAS. Understanding By Design (UbD). Knowing and teaching the underlying concepts is at the core of UbD. As a school we are continually working on best reaching every student using these strategies. - understand the school's expectations.
- supervise the completion of practice home assignments.
- communicate regularly with the school and their child's teachers regarding successes and difficulties that the child experiences with home assignments.
- communicate problems or concerns about their child's progress, or any other information that might help the school to better understand the child and to develop and deliver appropriate instruction.

With report cards fast approaching and progress reports recently having gone home, let's continue to support our children at school and home, and keep our lines of communication open.
