I want to thank everyone for the warm welcome I have received since arriving at KAS last week. I am settling in and getting to know many students, staff and parents.

I am looking forward to our International Potluck Dinner and School Community Show today. I want to thank everyone who has helped put this event together, especially the Committee overseeing the event.

There are many areas of school life that a Superintendent is involved. I want to share with you the areas that I am focusing on during this time before the Winter break.

One of the most important duties of a Superintendent is to hire qualified experienced teaching staff. I will be presenting a plan to the School Board soon about what the needs will be for next year. The good news is that it appears there will not be a large turnover of staff. As new teachers are hired I will share this information with the KAS community.

Next year KAS will be working on re-accreditation with the Middle States Association and the Council of International Schools. School accreditation is a school improvement process. The staff will be using in-service time during the rest of this school year to prepare curriculum documentation for re-accreditation. The staff have also identified student assessment, differentiation in teaching, and classroom management of areas to work on during in-service days. I am looking forward to working with the staff on these important issues.

Since we do not have an Elementary Principal as planned this year, I will be taking on some of the important duties of the Elementary Principal. Much of my teaching experience was in upper elementary grades and I also served as the Primary Principal at the Copenhagen International School for two years.

Activities of Middle School Student Council



AP CHEMISTRY AT KAS

Mr Don's Advanced Placement Chemistry class has been busy learning about how matter and energy interact on an atomic scale, and how different substances absorb radiation in different ways. Recently, students used a visible-light spectrophotometer to measure the absorption spectrum of the compound named crystal violet, and then used the information to assay a sample of crystal violet solution. Next semester, they will employ the same instrument to investigate the kinetics of a reaction involving crystal violet.

AP Chemistry students have also learned about a special process called chromatography, which is very effective at separating chemical compounds for analysis. The students used paper chromatography to separate a mixture of colored dyes. There are many different types of chromatography and spectroscopy, and together these two techniques can be used to analyze virtually every compound on Earth.



The AP Chemistry is learning how sophisticated instruments can yield valuable information about the nature of chemical compounds, creating a better understanding of the amazing world we live in.
