Letter from the Superintendent, Steven Alexander

It was a great night at KAS last Thursday. I was fortunate to arrive a few days before the annual International Potluck Dinner and Student Performance. The event gave me a good understanding why KAS is a strong family community and a very special school. The food was superb, the student performances were very entertaining and showcased the musical and performing talents of many students. I want to thank everyone for the hard work and efforts that made this a memorable evening.

Arriving after the school year has started presents special challenges. I appreciate the warm welcome and help everyone is giving me to help with meeting the challenges at KAS. Two issues are foremost on my agenda.

The first issue is determining the staffing needed for next year and to start right away with recruiting high quality staff. One of the most important duties of a Superintendent is to ensure that qualified and experienced staff are employed where they are needed. The present staff have informed me of their intentions for next year. Unlike last year fewer teachers will be leaving. I expect to hire six new staff members, two will be for positions that went unfilled this year due to visa problems. The list includes:

- Elementary Principal
- Learning Center Coordinator
- Grade 4 Teacher (Mr. Hanro will be teaching PE next year and continue to serve as Athletic Director
- Grade 3 Teacher
- Grade 2 Teacher
- Pre-School Teacher (for 3 years old)

I will be attending a large recruiting fair in the United States at the end of January interviewing prospective candidates. As they are appointed, we will introduce them to the community.

The second issue is finishing the documentation of the school curriculum and then listing it on the KAS website for parents and prospective families to view. This is especially important for people looking for a school when coming to Khartoum. I would like to congratulate the KAS staff for the excellent work they have accomplished in writing the curriculum we are using. Our goal is to get it listed on the website by the end of this school year.

The Benefits of Family Chores

While it may seem easier to do the housework yourself, having your children help you with chores can teach them a sense of responsibility and increase their sense of family unity. It also develops their fine and large motor skills. What chores a child can help with, will depend on their age, ability, and maturity, but even toddlers can help out around the house.

When to Assign Chores

Children can begin helping with chores as young as 3 years old, depending on their maturity level and ability to perform a routine task. Instead of assigning arbitrary tasks, give children jobs that match their abilities. For example, toddlers are able to pick up toys and put them in the toy box. As they get older, they will be able to add steps such as putting books on a shelf, putting their clothes in their dresser drawers, and eventually clean their whole room. Once they know the steps to many chores, you can even let your children choose which chores they are responsible for doing.

Perform Chores Together

One of the most important things to remember about assigning chores to your children is that they will learn best by example. Instead of telling your children to do a list of jobs, give them just a few at a time and work alongside them to show them the steps involved to complete the chore. Gradually, you can let them work alone and assign new chores, as you deem necessary.

Also, it is important to break down the job into workable components. It is unrealistic to tell a 5 year old, "Go clean your room." Instead, tell him the tasks involved that he will understand. You might say:

- 1. "Pick up your toys and put them in your toy box."
- 2. "Put your dirty clothes into the laundry basket."
- 3. "Throw any garbage in the waste basket."
- "Put your books on your bookshelf."

Breaking down a large task into smaller tasks will yield greater results because children will know what is expected of them.

Make it Fun

Chores do not have to be work. Instead, they can be a great chance for parents and children to bond and have fun together. Create fun, colorful chore charts and reward your children for completing chores with stickers, small treats, or even such things as television, computer, or playtime. Turn on the radio and dance to music while you complete chores with your child. Better yet, assign everyone in the household (yes, even mom and dad) with daily chores. Try to schedule a consistent time every day during which everyone on the house works on their chores. Try singing and dancing to music with your children while you work to make it even more fun!

Benefits of Chores for Kids

While the obvious is true – a cleaner home – there are many other benefits to getting your children involved in chores. Being expected to complete chores on regular basis teaches responsibility and accountability, two characteristics they will carry with them later in life. Having a few chores to complete every day allows children to feel they are part of a team, which will prepare them for working with schoolmates and teammates. Finally, learning new chores to do around the house allows children to learn new skills that are easily transferable into the classroom setting.

So, don't hesitate to ask for a little help from your little ones. It will pay off in more ways than you can imagine!

The **Bitter End** is the absolute end. This phrase has its origins at sea and is nothing to do with taste. On the sailing ships of past centuries, the anchor was fixed to the deck by solid bollards made of iron and wood known as 'bitts'. In Kigh School and Middle School students are working hard to reach their main goal, which is to develop their speaking skills. This is done through oral work and writing dialogues,








