IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT

Dear Parents,

As you all know, due to unrest in Khartoum last October and the closure of the school as per a decision made by the Ministry of Education a total of eight school days were lost. Here is how we, at Khartoum American School, plan to make up those missed school days.

We have 2 days built into our school calendar for Parent-Teacher Conferences and another 3 days built into our calendar for Professional Development days for teachers. The Parent-Teacher Conferences days and Professional Development days were supposed to be held during the day and students would have had no classes on that day. It has been recommended by the teachers and approved by the board that we will make up 5 school days by scheduling the Parent-Teacher Conferences during evenings and the Professional Development Days for teachers on Saturdays. We will make up the 3 remaining school days that were missed as follows:

- The half days at the end of every semester will • become a whole school day. We will make up another 1 day by doing this.
- We will have school for students on 2 Saturdays. We will let you know as soon as we set the dates for those 2 days.

Who wrote the Birthday Song????

Without doubt, the issue of Digital Citizenship has become one of the most important issues that teachers and parents need to address, in terms of educating the children of the 21st century. The future of this generation will depend so much on communication skills through technology, so it is incumbent upon them that they become proficient in using a variety of different online sources. Nowadays, students assume that everything available in the digital world is accessible and meant to be shared with the rest of the world for FREE. This of course is not true, as the idea of Intellectual Property Rights has taken on a whole new meaning in the digital world.

During this quarter, I had the pleasure of introducing the topic of digital citizenship to grade 8 students. We started by reviewing the 9 rules of digital citizenship. To bring a greater understanding of this; we created a very interesting activity around this concept and the song. Students worked in-groups creating their own version of a birthday song. Each group made its own lyrics and music for a birthday song. They spent time and worked really hard to be sure that no one from the other group stole their ideas or listened to their song before they finished it. They were very creative and the outcome was amazing. Most importantly, they used the Creative Commons Website to make a license for their work. The goal of the activity was to let them learn and comprehend why it is important to respect other people's work and understand the copyright rules.

Their creativity was beyond my expectations! The students were very engaged in the lesson and I'm sure the experience will stay with them for a long time.

In my opinion, nowadays students learn by real life connections and experiences; and the activity we implemented was a good example. They also did very well collaborating with each other and working in teams. Please take a look at the following examples of their lyrics:




