We each began our teaching career in private Waldorf schools in the United States, and then progressed as educators through the U.S. public school system and most recently into the international school movement. She is currently teaching at the Shaikha Hessa Girls' School in Bahrain. Juliane has master in culinary and fiber arts, as well as in nutrition, and, like me, has great interest in a broad range of subjects.


