It is large – 54 square meters at its largest dimensions, but can also be arranged for a smaller area. It is very versatile and will be useful for many different events. We are all very excited about this.

Using Technology to Motivate Middle School ESL Students



How do we as ESL teachers teach middle school scholars essential grammar skills without boring them to death with "the rules"? It's actually quite simple: by teaching grammar in context. And in a fun way!

From my experience, middle school students learn best when they are actively engaged with the content. When students participate in hands-on, inquiry-based learning, they develop lasting skills that often translate into higher levels of student achievement. Computer-based approaches help students develop higher order thinking and problem solving skills. As students are busy handling data and learning by doing, involvement in their own learning increases along with enthusiasm. Students are no longer passive

recipients of knowledge; they become active participants in the learning process.

Over the last two weeks, middle school ESL students were asked to create a presentation that demonstrates their understanding of English parts of speech. Each student chose one part and presented it using a technology application tool such as PowerPoint or Prezi. The 10-15 minutes presentation was then followed by an interactive game or a quiz that engaged the whole class. Moreover, receiving the feedback from the class was thrilling! Yohanes, a grade 8 student remarked," I think this is a much better approach than the worksheets, because we' re doing the work not the teacher!"

"During this experience, I have learned a lot about different kinds of adjectives and adverbs. It was hard work, but it was worth it in the end", confirmed M.I, grade 8. Sukaina and M.E, grade 7 added," This presentation was very helpful. We learned how to work as one group and it has helped us to write using correct grammar in Language Art lessons."

Yes, all the hard work has been worth it.

English Sayings...

To be **Put Through The Hoop** means to be punished or chastised for a wrongdoing. This is a nautical phrase related to the ancient marine custom of 'running the hoop'. The punishment comprised four or more convicted sailors being stripped to the waist, and having their left hands tied to an iron hoop. In the other hand each would hold a length of rope known as a nettle. The bosun would then hit one sailor with a cat o' nine tales and he in turn would have to hit the man in front of him. Being put 'through the ordeal of the hoop' later became shortened to the phrase we know today. Originally, it was a form of horseplay when the ship was in calm waters, but as each blow landed the angry recipient would land a harder blow on the man in turn. As it went on the blows became harder, leading to its effectiveness more as a punishment rather than a game.
