### Student Access of Websites at School

Like many international schools KAS has adopted a one to one computer laptop program with the belief this will allow teachers and students to assist student learning by using a variety of resources through the computer. While in theory this is a sound and logical use of technology, in practice there can be serious problems that can be detrimental to students.

The reality is that students frequently access inappropriate websites. In order to control student access in school, many schools use filtering software via a firewall to control student website access. What is appropriate for students to access should be determined by the school's mission and core values. At KAS the school administration, school board and technology department have been reviewing our student website access for the past 5 months. We have revised our Acceptable User Policy (AUP) based on what we believe should be appropriate access at KAS. We have revised our policy and have shared this policy with the school staff to solicit their input. This policy will officially go into effect at the beginning of the next school year.

Along with revising the new policy we have purchased a new firewall for our system that will allow us to filter out access to students and staff during the school hours of inappropriate websites. We are testing the firewall now until the end of the school year to make sure it will do what we want it to do.

There are two categories that we are focusing on with regard to inappropriate access. The first is social media such as "Facebook", "Twitter", "YouTube", etc. We believe students should not be accessing social media sites during school time as it often distracts students from the work they need to do at school. The other category is pornography and related material sites. This we do for the obvious reason that students should not be accessing this at anytime.

The blocking we are doing does not affect student access at home. We believe parents should be discussing appropriate website access with their children and relate it to family cultural practices and morals. We believe it is extremely important that parents do this and also regularly look at what their children are doing on computers at home.

We know that the Sudanese government blocks several websites, but most of us know that this can be circumvented by the use of a VPN account which can be purchased on the internet and used to access blocked websites. At KAS we are blocking VPN access to students and staff. During this month I will write more about this issue and address ways that parents can communicate with their children to help them understand the importance of acceptable use of their computers.

Teachers are able to post and track class information that is accessible to students and parents, in one place. Students and parents can view grades, assignments and upcoming projects or events. 

## What is student centered teaching

Translate this problem to a senior student who struggles with literature. The teacher will not dumb down the curriculum for the student who struggles, but will try to identify the reason or reasons why the student struggles. It could be that the student is a kinetic learner which means that the teacher needs to think of ways to teach the student literature in a tactile way - she may ask him to build a model, design a poster or make a video. Once the kinetic learner has gained the knowledge the teacher needs to help him transfer this knowledge onto paper by writing about the work. If this is done properly the student will feel valuable and not stupid. This encourages the student to try harder and to take responsibility for his own learning as he knows he can do it. Ignoring the problem or dumbing down the curriculum would mean the student will feel like a loser and be unlikely to succeed at tertiary level or in the harsh business world.

Plain laziness and then expecting the teacher to put in extra hours to help, is not student centered and in no way prepares students for the future. In a truly student centered environment expectations of students are extremely high as the excuse, "he cannot do it" simply does not exist. In turn demands on teachers in a student centered school are equally high as the needs of every student in the class is taken into consideration, which means that teachers in student centered schools are simply too busy to babysit.
