

Theater Production

On Thursday 8th May 2014, high school and middle school students joined ranks to perform William Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream. It was quite fitting; throughout the world people are celebrating the 450th anniversary of the birth of Shakespeare these days. Therefore, the play was rather timely.

The setting for the play was the Stone Garden and the students demonstrated creativity and imagination with their choice of venue. In fact, it was the perfect place to perform this play, particularly the scenes with the fairies and young lovers in the woods. This capitalized on the excellent work of Mrs. Sanchez's Goal Group last year that had the brilliant idea of transforming an under-utilized part of our campus. It made a truly magical scene, complete with curtains, fairy lights, and a little theater in the round feel.

As for the play itself, the script was rewritten by M.J. from grade 10 with an interesting selection of music from the twenties, fifties, sixties, seventies and eighties. This created a number of moods, keeping within the boundaries of the play while at the same time putting the students' own mark and creativity on it. Lines from the original were retained out of respect for the Great Bard. The audience appeared to really enjoy it and seemed to welcome something that was a little different.


However, what made this elective class so very different was the fact that it was a student- centered performance. The teacher acted as a facilitator and refrained as much as possible from putting his mark, style and influences on it. Difficult for me because I have some hard and fast rules when teaching Shakespeare, the most important being: it has to be done in the original language. The students didn't want that so we negotiated and came up with a solution. Like we negotiated, argued, came into conflict, and got upset about everything, but in the end came together in the spirit of cooperation as a team. The drama was wonderful, everyone enjoyed the final performance, but the real learning was the life-skills the students took away from it, including responsibility and accountability.

Wild Animal Wonders

Did you know that elephants have long eyelashes to help them keep the dust out of their eyes? Did you know that giraffes have more than one stomach? (In fact, they have four!) Did you know that ostriches do NOT really put their heads under the sand when they are afraid? These are just some of the very interesting facts you can learn by visiting the second grade classroom this month! Second graders have become wild animal experts. Students enjoyed devouring library books and internet articles to learn about the wild animal of their choice. After intense research, students created their very own animal encyclopedias. They can now be sure to tell you about their animal's appearance, behavior, diet, habitat, young, and other interesting tidbits of information you probably didn't already know. Upon completion of their books, students participated in a wild animal exposition by sharing their books with the other students in the class in a rotating forum. Students are now working on making a three-dimensional animal project based on the facts they have learned. So come by the second grade classroom

to check out our creative work. Have fun and keep up the great learning, second graders!
