Animal Habitat



The Discovery unit entitled "Here today gone tomorrow" involved students investigating the main idea that plants and animals, including humans, each live in a habitat. Human activity can have a considerable effect on natural habitats.

Taking action to protect habitats from harmful changes could provide a healthy and sustainable environment for many species in the future.

They created posters using the art style of Picasso to draw the endangered species. They also used the campaign #BringBackOurEndangered Species to create an awareness for this important global issue. They created iMovie presentations to further investigate the plight of endangered species. The grade fours have been debating issues like paperless schools; we need a zoo in Khartoum, signing a petition to improve the welfare of the animals in the pet section at Souq Waqif, Doha Qatar.

The New Zoo in Khartoum

Good morning Chairman, fellow students and distinguished guests. My name is Maximilien Etienne Brugma and I speak for the animals (Speak for the trees- The Lorax, Dr. Seuss).

Today I am here to talk about The New Zoo.

Here are some reasons why I do not agree with this idea:

- 1. Some animals need space to run around and be with other animals of their species. If they give them lots of space that will be good, but they also need things that they would normally have. Here's An example: A tiger will be in the zoo with lots of space say 30 meters of just dirt and sand.
- 2. They need trees, grass, seeds, plants mud, vines all that but you might not have it because of where you are.
- Another reason is they need to keep their way of living in their habitat. If you feed the animals then they will never learn to hunt and when they are free they will be lost and will die very soon.
- 4. Now yesterday my dad read an article about how certain animals change behavior for the rest of their lives because of getting frightened with loud noises and people. So if a bunch of people look at an animal and get really close and make loud noises near you it could change the animals' behavior their whole life and also that will not turn out so well.

Learning Math - Attitude, not Ability Counts

Several months ago, while perusing the internet, I found an article written by Vasily Fedosenko for Reuters. It began, "Contrary to popular opinion, a natural ability in math will only get you so far in studies of the subject. Research published in Child Development found that hard work and good study habits were the most important factors in improving math ability over time." Every math teacher will agree with that statement, but I'm sure not every student or parent would.

Fedosenko then discusses a study conducted by Patricia Linehan from Purdue University. She says that our learning abilities can be classified into two types. The first being "incremental orientation" and the second being "entity or ientation." Incremental orientation is a belief that we learn in small steps and that we can continually get better by studying and practicing. "I am not good at math and I never will be," is an example of entity orientation. How can students become motivated if they hold such a belief?

As it turns out, how a student studies greatly influences their improvement in math. Students who made deeper connections with other areas of math improved over time, while those who sought to memorize techniques, didn't improve

Researchers also found that when learning math, a student interested in improving because he wanted a better grade, did not improve as much as a student who was simply interested in math.

Math ability is not in the genes. We must always encourage our children to practice math like any other skill. They practice football, the piano or French, don't they? Math needs

to be continually practiced. How many times have math teachers heard, "I learned it for the test last week, but I forgot it over the weekend."? If the problem is, my child can't do math, then the solution would be, practice, practice, practice.

A ship's captain who had been left 'high and dry' could do nothing to resolve his situation until the tide returned and refloated his boat. In the meantime the ship was exposed and vulnerable.
