Dear Parents and Friends,

Now that the summer break is officially over and behind us, students are back to school, they have received their laptops and classes are now in full swing.

As I visit classes around the school, it struck me once again, how extremely important the skill of reading is for all the children. In Mr. Michael's Grade 7 Language Arts class, he asked his students a question, "what would a world without words look like"? The students started responding to the question and they quickly realized what a boring world it would be. Of course, we all know that reading is one of the most important skills children (and anyone) must master to succeed in school and to succeed in life. Almost everything we do involves reading in some form and it is undoubtedly one of the best practices to stimulate intellectual development in students.

Here is a list, in no particular order, of some reasons why students should read:

- Reading expands a child's vocabulary.
- Reading works as an exercise to improve reading fluency and comprehension. You can't comprehend what you can't read.
- Reading is directly related to a child's academic success.
- Reading helps improve grammar, sentence structure and enhances communication skills.
- Reading helps improve writing skills. Reading different texts can be used as a model for the student's own writing and essays.
- Reading helps independence and self-confidence.
- Reading helps us make more sense of the world around us.
- Reading enhances imagination.
- Reading helps you relax and reduces stress.
- Reading is a free and enjoyable activity.

Reading is a skill that all the teachers at Khartoum American School work hard to encourage in all of our students. Because reading is so important to children's success in school, we ask that parents help their children become interested in reading and encourage growth in their reading skills.

Maybe you could all encourage an activity that involves reading with your child this weekend e.g. cooking (reading a recipe), constructing a kite (reading directions), or plan a holiday (reading a reference book or searching the Internet).

Will some form of technology replace the written word?



In this dystopian world most people are fixed into brain-drain entertainment systems and reading and writing is a thing of the past. Spaz meets an old man called Ryter, and begins to learn about the history of Earth. With his aged companion, Spaz sets off an unlikely hero's quest to save his dying sister - and hopefully a world that has been plunged into ignorance.

The book is very engaging and our lesson activities have brought into much sharper focus the way in which words play such a dominant role in our lives as well as the importance of reading and writing, be it by traditional books, e-books or going to web sites.
