If we have not yet met, please feel free to find me on campus any day and introduce yourself to me. My office is across from the first grade classroom. You may also want to read my introduction of myself and my wife, Juliane Rothan-Centers (who teaches Science to KAS Grades 6, 7, 8 and 9), to the KAS community in the February 20, 2014 school PreK is our 4-year-old children newsletter. Being new in a community can help us see everything with fresh eyes, and there is so much to take in and learn here at KAS and in Khartoum.
