Dear Parents,

IMPORTANT MESSAGE REGARDING SAFETY AND SECURITY AT KAS!!

SAFETY is of the highest priority for our students, for our staff and for you.

When children and adults come to the KAS campus, we want everyone who is permitted to be on the campus to know we are taking the maximum precautions to provide a safe school environment. And, we want the members of the larger community (community members who may not be current members of the KAS school family) to understand that KAS is very serious about safety at all times.

Toward that end we have and will be putting into place strict regulations, for example, on the entry of vehicles and individuals who wish to enter the campus. In an E News message from me earlier this year, I wrote that all cars of KAS parents or guardians must show their KAS security sticker. Please be advised that starting this SUNDAY, September 21st if a car does not display the KAS security sticker it will not be permitted to enter the campus. If you need a sticker you can pick one up from the administration office.

An additional strict security measure will be the requirement that all adults (parents and KAS staff) show a KAS issued ID before they are permitted to enter the campus. We will send more information about the KAS IDs as the IDs are developed.

We ask for your full cooperation and understanding in the implementation of these strict security measures. Although there are some who may feel this is an unnecessary inconvenience, experience tells us that such prevention and proactive actions are indeed very important and necessary.

Dear KAS Community,

A book is a special thing. It's like a seed. Within its small space is contained hundreds or thousands of words that are strung together like pearls on a string. These words, the order that they are strung in sentences, paragraphs, and chapters, stimulate our imagination like little else in the world can do. They open worlds in our imagination that would have remained dormant in us without the power of the word. Like a seed, these imaginations grow into something strong in our lives. From the example of the worlds we access through our imaginations, from the stimulation of books, along with the examples of the living people in our lives, we construct the edifice of our characters. We decide what is noble for us, and how we want to be noble like that as well, like the best people we have known, and the best people we have heard about, and the best people and the most wonderful stories and worlds we have read about.

A good book is a treasure because we treasure it. We know a book will be a treasure for us when we see it and walk away from it and afterwards we can't stop thinking about it. We know that we want to have that book, either to borrow it from the library or from a friend, or to purchase it so it can be part of our own library or treasure of books. That book tells us something about the world that we want to know through reading about it, and we want to remember it by being able to read about it again and again, as often as we like. So our books, the ones we have taken time to read, especially more than once, and the once we have taken the trouble to purchase to have in our personal libraries or treasure houses of books, are extensions of ourselves. We can tell a lot about a person from the books we notice in their libraries.

Because a book is a special thing, because a book is a seed, because a book is a treasure, it is always a wonderful thing to be around good books. They call to us. A good bookstore or book sale or library is like a symphony of songs singing to us. I can spend hours in a good bookstore just admiring the ingenuity of the authors who have imagined and/or researched the stories surrounding me in such a place, admiring the quality of the craftsmanship that went into editing and illustrating and printing and binding these gifts to humanity. This admiration renews my joy at being a member of the human race.

We have had such a symphony of songs of books on our campus this week at our Scholastic Book Fair. I took time, only a few minutes that I was able to spare but it was enough, to admire the books on the tables and stands, and walked away. One book about big cats called me back, and I purchased it. It clarified for me my understanding of big cats that was only partial before, and is of course still only partial but is more complete and clear than it was. Stop by my office and take a look at this book and at the other one I purchased on the life of the first African-American to play baseball in the American Major Leagues – Jackie Robinson. Let's pass the book passion on to our children!

is a phrase used to emphasise weakness and childish manner in an adult. The original Namby Pamby was the poet Ambrose Philips (1674-1749), a fellow of St John's College, Cambridge. Philips had achieved success with both The Distrest Mother (1712) and his later adaptation of Racine's Andromaque, but his infantile language was ridiculed by the great poets of his day. It was Henry Carey who bestowed on Philips the nickname 'Namby Pamby' because his verses were addressed mainly to babies, and it was quickly adopted as part of the English language.


