The Wisdom of William

As teachers and parents we encourage our children to be brave, independent, and self-confident. However, there is another side to the coin, which also tells us to protect them from pain, defeat, humiliation, and disappointment. Throwing caution to the wind is very dangerous and most people will agree that it is a wise man/woman who knows his/her limitations. Therefore, it could be argued that caution is a very wise character trait to have.

However, if one exercises too much caution and is frightened of trying new things or equally important, different things, then one could end up living a life of unexplored potentialities and the attendant regrets that accompany such a life. When we don't attempt new things, and stick to the status quo because of the fear of failing, or in some cases because we don't receive the encouragement from the people around us, we effectively make ourselves prisoners of our own doubts. Your doubts obstruct your thinking so you're beaten before you start. Caution is good, but isn't always a recipe for success and a life fulfilled.

Geometric Drawing Exploratory

Every other G period in the middle school schedule, a mixed group of 6th, 7th and 8th graders come to my classroom to practice their skills with a compass and straight edge. They start by drawing six divisions of a circle and then learn to bisect arcs and lines. Once they draw a precise geometric figure, the students color it using good colored pencils and practice shading the color from light to dark. As the term progresses, the drawings become more and more complex and challenging.

This exercise is extremely beneficial to the middle school student. First they must practice precision. Much of precision is actually learning to SEE – seeing where the mistakes are and how they are created. Then they must commit to do the work. Students learn that precision goes hand in hand with commitment and that often, taking the time to do it right the first time saves time in the long run. If it isn't precise, I require it to be redrawn until it is. Sometimes students must redraw the figure 5-6 times before it is precise.

Once they have the drawing- which every other student also draws- each student then has to decide how they are going to make it uniquely their own. By choosing colors, patterns, and shading techniques, each student creates a completely different design. Students find this very satisfying. I like to have relaxing music playing quietly in the background during their coloring and shading to increas the level of relaxation and enjoyment. I am always impressed with the focus and creativity of my students in these classes.

Who knew geometry could be so fun? Who knew art could be so demanding?








