The timing of receiving this notice is not so strange; it simply confirms that differentiation is "in the air" so to speak, being talked about and explored in educational circles everywhere. This is because educators know or are coming to realize how crucial the practice of differentiation is for student success and satisfaction. And what this training notice suggests is true: advancements in technology are allowing us to differentiate our instruction in ways not possible before. It behooves us to take advantage of every opportunity technology offers us to increase student learning and well-being through differentiation as well as other best practices.

Khartoum American School recognizes the importance of using cutting-edge technology to enhance our students' experience and success. The KAS Board has committed to making 21st Technology a major focus of our strategic plan for the next four years. Our amazing IT team is continuously bringing in new technology to help our teachers, most recently the introduction of an "e-beam" projector in the computer lab, which will be rolled out to each section (MS, HS and ES) soon. Next month KAS will be implementing the MAPS (Measures of Academic Progress) assessment system to all students, 3rd through 10th grades, which is a leading digital differentiation assessment tool. "W hat on Earth are you talking about? Aren't you working on a math problem right now? $\int$
treah. It says (points and reads problem out loud), 'Estimate what would be the best weight of a floor lamp.' $\int$ "Soooooo...what do you think a floor lamp is? $\int$
"A sheep...right? If there are sheep for the floor, are the ones for the sky? W ould those ones be lighter? S
"'Are you thinking of `lamb?' Like: I-a-m-B? A baby sheep? A LAMP is something for a house that gives light. $\int$ "Ooooooooooh. Yep. Yep. Yep. Those words be tricky Ms. Meyer.f

In our class we're working on explaining our answers thoroughly. The word "because" is important because it's followed by the reason you know the answer is sight. During one quided reading session. we read a book about a magic coat. Many of the "reasons" for the answers to the comprehension questions were. "because the coat is magic." I must of offhandedly said something along the lines of "magic" being kind of an interesting reason because it can really be used for anything because it's magical and can make anything happen. One student decided that he was really going to take advantage of that mention because his next response paper lon a completely different book and topic) looked like this:
Q. Why did the author write this book?

A: Because magic
Q: How are broccoli and oranges similar?
A: They're healthy because magic
O: How do you know that these foods are healthy?
A: Because magic
Q: Is the book fiction or non-fiction?
A: It's non-fiction and I know because magic.
Q: What was one fact you found most interesting? Why? A: Avocados are good for you. Because magic

I had a student who was extremely agitated during a guided reading activity for the book "Blackbeard the Pirate." She couldn't concentrate and seemed to be having some sort of internal conflict. I gave her some time. but she couldn't seem to get over whatever was bothering her so finally I asked her if there was something on her mind.
"I just can't figure out." she said slowly. "how Blackbeard's mum and dad knew that he was going to have a black beard. How would they know when he was a baby that he was going to look like that when he got older? They named him Blackbeard. but what if he had a brown beard instead? Or no beard? They're lucky he turned out to be a pirate and that his name was the same as his hair color?

A student wrote down " 6 " for the answer to a math story problem. "How did you get 6?" I asked, "You have to explain to me how you got the answer. Show me where the 6 came from. Otherwise I might think you just copied it off of [kid who sits next to himJ's paper."
I came back 3 minutes later to check, expecting an equation, but instead read the following underneath his answer:
"I got 6 because I used my brain. That's how I get all answers. Ms. Meyer tells us to use our brains and I used my brain. I used my brain really hard and I got 6 . How do I get 6? My brain. It was my brain. Not [kid who sits next to me]'s brain. My brain is better than his brain. I got 6 ."
I've never seen this 2nd grader write this much for a math answer. Also, next to his explanation there was a picture of a brain with a 6 on top of it. 2nd Grade Teacher

## The schedule for the KAS Swim Squads is:

On Sunday, March 22, 2015 the Senior Squad (Grade 5- Grade 12) Coach AlSheriff will be next to the pool to assist these swimmers with their strokes.

To be eligible for the Senior Squad, swimmers must meet the times criteria and commit to a minimum of 3 to 4 sessions a week.
On Monday, March 23, 2015 we will have the Development Squad (KG-Grade 2) splashing and dashing in the water with coach Sara.

Development Squad requires the development of all four strokes over 25 m and to increase the range of aquatic skills in preparation for the next level, while preparing the swimmer to progress to our Junior Squads.

On Wednesday, March 24, 2015 the Junior Squad (Grade 3 to Grade 8) will have their first training session swimming like fish They will have completed Development Squad.

The aim for the Junior Squad is to increase their training commitment throughout the year, as well as competing regularly at appropriate galas. These swimmers will be asked to come on Sunday as to increase their training times.
