

Danny Kaye's song 'The Ugly Duckling', which was released in the 1950s, popularized the story all over the world.

Letter from the Early Childhood/Elementary School Principal, Phil Centers

Dear Parents, Teachers, and Community Members, As you know, here at Khartoum American School we genuinely value the visual and performing arts. In the Elementary School each student receives instruction in Music twice a week and in Art twice a week. All students also have the opportunity to participate in other artistic activities, such as dance and crafts, in our After School Activities Program, and to perform in small and major dramatic productions during the course of the year.

These periods of artistic instruction and experience may open doors to career-impacting opportunities as our students become adults. For instance, to be musically-literate undoubtedly allows one access to options not available to the musically non-literate, just as being language-literate and math-literate do. But regardless of whether our students become lifelong practitioners of a musical instrument and/or other artistic discipline, their artistic instruction and experiences in school are sure to enhance their total development as human beings, and are likely to improve their academic performance and achievement. This has been the finding of research into art instruction in school.
