

In the second week of January I attended an educational conference in Budapest, Hungary on how to continully improve our support of English language learners. This course was a real eye opener for me. Not only did I learn new strategies to improve academic achievement for English learners, I was reminded how challenging learning English can be for our students. The challenge appears to be rooted in what it means to "learn English" in school. Academically successful English learners do not simply learn to manage their everyday lives in English-speaking contexts, they also learn "to negotiate multiple academic environments, make sense of complex content, articulate their understanding of that content in academic forms, and assess their own growing understanding. That is, they learn to use 'academic language.'" (H.Gary Cook)

During the conference we had the opportunity to discuss and answer essential questions such as: What does it mean to be "English proficient"?, How long does it take English learners to reach this status?, and many more. Overall, we all agreed that reaching language proficiency takes time and requires attention to students' linguistic, cultural and academic needs.
