Dear Parents and Community Members,

At our staff professional development day on March 13th I gave a presentation to my colleagues entitled "How to talk so students will listen, and listen so students will talk." Unfortunately the time we had together that morning permitted me only to scratch the surface of this important topic, which is, after all, one of foundation stones of all we do with our students. With excellent communication skills all our teaching will be enhanced, and without these skills even our best efforts to convey ideas and skills to our students will fall short of what they could be.

The issue of effective communication with children, that builds self-esteem rather than tears it down, has been a topic dear to me for many years. This interest began when a parent of one of my second grade students in 1989 gave me the book, "Teacher and Child" by Haim Ginott. I figured that this parent gave me this book because 1. she felt that my communication skills could be improved, and 2. she felt that there was some hope for me! I am very grateful to have received this book, because it set me on a course of development that continues to this day.

Up until that point I communicated with my students and my own children (who were quite young then) much as everyone else around me communicated, at least as far as I could tell. I had no idea that there was a kind of "science" of effective communication, and this skill could be learned. My communication habits were pretty deeply ingrained, and it took me years of training and practice to be able to speak with students in an effective way. Of course I, like others, sometimes revert back to my old patterns of communication, for instance if I'm in a hurry. However, I can usually tell when this has happened because of the response of the student(s) I'm communicating with. There is a definite difference in the response of someone to respectful and effective communication as opposed to disrespectful and ineffective communication.

One of my professional goals is that the ECC & ES staff cultivate effective communication with each other and with our students. I am proud of all that we've accomplished in this regard, and at the same time we've probably just scratched the surface, because this is a lifelong learning challenge. I look forward to continuing our development of good communication with each other and with our students. I believe we notice the difference when good communication is taking place!

Many are afraid that tackling climate change is going to be too costly. Here are some easy ways to make a contribution:

- Wearing a seatbelt is known to reduce serious injuries and deaths by about half.
- Refrain from making impulse purchases. When we purchase more unnecessary items we spend our money wastefully and create more waste for the earth.
- Politicians not listening? Be the change you want to see! Look at the major environmental challenges in your local community and rather than waiting for the elected leaders to listen to your concerns, make a difference by doing it yourself. For example, organize a monthly cleanup operation with like-minded people, which will not only benefit the neighborhood but also allow the participants to get some exercise.
- Build a community garden to provide produce for your neighborhood. At KAS we have built multiple garden beds as an example of how this can be done.
- It may sound obvious, but in our stressful and fast-paced lives it's easy to forget how important small acts of kindness really are. Being nice costs nothing and is probably the most important thing of all we can do, every single day.

These examples are only small illustrations of how each one of us can become more resilient by making choices that improve our health, protect our environment and build a financial safety net, and how simple approaches can make that more fun and sustainable.


