Congratulations KAS Swim Team!

The KAS swim team enjoyed a great day of racing at the KICS Swim Meet last Tuesday April 19, 2016. The team consisted of nine swimmers who swam some strong times at the KICS pool.



50 m Backstroke

The girls 11 and under event saw a win with Mina Shimizu claiming victory in 53.75 ahead of the KICS duo of Leila and Elise. In the boys 14 and under race saw Yuga Shimizu (44.65) going a stellar one claiming victory for KAS.

50 m Breaststroke

Mina Shimizu from KAS was in a class of her own in the 11 and under event for girls when she produced a classy 52.28 to demolish the field with a scintillating performance. The minor placing's were secured by Muhammed Hadra (1:18.04) Mina's brother Yuga showed a clean set of heels in claiming a double for the KAS team when he stormed to victory posting a 44.84 well ahead of KICS' Abu (46.19) and David (49.28) Divya Ghetia had a fair time of (55.67) in 5th place.

50 m Freestyle

KAS' Mina raced to gold in the girls 11 and under age group in a time of 43.37 getting only better as the afternoon sun set over Khartoum. In the boys 11 and under Muhammed Hadra had a thrilling battle for the minor placing's just edging Mark from KICS out in 50.00 for the third place, and Ibrahim Omer (1:10.59) in 5th place.

The boys event was another hotly contested affair, much to the crowds delight. It was KAS' Yuga in the 14 and under age group (35.02) claiming the bragging rights ahead of Akram (37.91) from KICS.

Anzel van der Merwe looked impressive in the girls 14 and under age group claiming victory in 41.19. Hazim Gamil after some difficulties in the 200 m race managed to scrape home in 8th place in 45.01. Tawfeeg Hadra (3:57.02) in the 14 and under boys group churned a good third place in the 200 m freestyle.

100 m Freestyle

Yula Maruyama in the 14 and under Girls group raced to a fast time 1:24.01 improving on her personal best time.

50 m Butterfly

KAS' golden girl Mina demonstrated her versatility when she claimed the girls 11 and under title in the 50m butterfly event. Her time of 43.37 was well ahead of KICS' Leila (01:07.7). Yula won the girls 14 and under event with 47.71. The boys' event saw Yuga (46.71) in second place after a long afternoon in the pool.

In the girls 14 and under Yula again struck gold with a fast 1:52.30 edging out KICS' Tamara (2:00.09).

Dear Parents,

In every process that is engaged in by human beings on a regular basis, it is good to have some sort of feedback loop or mechanism to be able to determine how well the process is proceeding. In the system of education this feedback loop has two parts, assessment and reporting. We assess our students to see how well they are doing in learning all that we are teaching them, and then we report the results of these assessments to all relevant parties so they can use the information.

Teachers use the information reported about their students' progress to improve their instruction. Educational feedback is crucial to teachers to determine how effective their instruction is. In order to determine how well students and other school stakeholders are doing, principals need to have a good feedback loop. Assessments of student progress are part of the set of good information that a principal uses to determine how the students are doing. This set also includes the principal's own observations and knowledge of the students, both in and outside of the classroom setting. The principal's observations supplement the teachers' assessments of their students.

Parents play a decisive role in the success of a school. The feedback they provide teachers and administrators about their child's experience of school, and their own, is essential to the healthy functioning of the school. A large part of the focus of our reporting about student progress is directed towards parents, in the form of conversations, email messages, conferences, progress reports, and report cards. The more that parents know about our educational process, and about how well it is proceeding, the more effective our process can be. Parents partnering with schools is understood to be a crucial component of the educational process.

We are approaching the end of the school year when student progress will be reported to parents in the form of report cards and the results of the MAP assessments. Please feel free to contact us with any questions you might have about the reporting of your child's progress in school. In addition, we invite parents at all times to share their feedback about their children's experience in school, and their own, with us so that we can continuously improve our educational process.
