# LETTER FROM ELEMENTARY PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Students, and Community Members,

One of the 4Cs of our school is Curriculum. Students, parents, and teachers sometimes wonder how Curriculum, something already fixed and outside of the student, can be on the same par as the other 3Cs of Character, Citizenship, and Community in helping our students to develop into outstanding human beings. Does it really belong as one of the 4Cs?

Character is certainly always within a person, and it is rarely fixed, because each person must cultivate their own character each day and the positive traits that accompany it, or these noble traits, this quality of being ethical, will be present in the individual on a limited basis if at all.

Citizenship isn't quite so deep as Character, but it is broad. Citizenship is the response of the individual to the needs and demands of the community, a dynamic quality which must always be sparked anew.

Community, like curriculum, is outside of us, but, unlike curriculum, we are automatically part of a community, in fact of many communities simultaneously (the community of human beings, of children or adults, etc.) just by who we are or where we happen to live. Some communities, however, require active effort on the part of their members—their citizens—to exist and thrive. The learning community of Khartoum American School, for example, is that kind of dynamic community that must be consciously created.

Curriculum is a course of study that we engage in, but this is set and fixed by the school, isn't it, so what does this have to do with helping our students to become wonderful human beings? Is it that the better our curriculum, the better human beings our students may become? Well, it's partly that of course, and we are continuously striving to improve our curriculum just for this very purpose. But there's a deeper level. Like community, we are all engaged in many curriculums (curricula) simultaneously. We may be students in a formal educational setting, and we may also be learning new skills at our places of work or for personal development or just for fun. We may learn new things from watching a movie or reading a book or listening to a young child or an old man or a friend, or stranger. We are all enrolled in the great school of Life, and our learning opportunities are endless. The degree that we recognize this fact and embrace it determines our success rate in mastering the curricula we are engaged in. So Curriculum as one of our 4Cs really means that we and our students are "curriculum-minded," i.é., that we are passionate about learning in the many forms it takes in our lives, that we are scholars of the knowledge, as well as of the mysteries, of life.

May we all be ethical, community-minded, scholar-citizens of KAS!

### The Maratona Del Golfo Capri- Napoli



# Learning to Read Reading to Learn

THE JUXTAPOSITION OF THESE WORDS DESCRIBES THE 5TH GRADE PERFECTLY. THE CHILDREN ARE TRANSITIONING FROM ELEMENTARY INTO MIDDLE SCHOOL, AND MOST OF THEIR LIVES ARE IN FLUX. SO MANY DOORS ARE OPENING INTELLECTUALLY FOR THE FIRST TIME AS THEY HOVER BETWEEN BEING CHILDREN AND TEENAGERS. AND LIKE ALL TRANSITIONS PEOPLE EXPERIENCE IN LIFE, A FOOT REMAINS IN EACH DOOR UNTIL THE CHANGE IS COMPLETE.



TAKE MATH. IN 5TH GRADE THE CLASS IS REVIEWING COMPUTATION, BUT AT THE SAME TIME IT'S BEING INTRODUCED TO ALGEBRAIC, GEOMETRIC, AND STATISTICAL CONCEPTS. SO WE AS A CLASS HOVER BETWEEN CONCRETE AND ABSTRACT IDEAS, WITH ONE FOOT IN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL AND THE OTHER IN MIDDLE SCHOOL.



THE KIDS EXPERIENCE A SIMILAR SHIFT IN LANGUAGE ARTS. ORAL COMMUNICATION AND READING HAVE STARTED TO SOLIDIFY; SO CONVERSATIONS ARE LENGTHIER AND CHAPTERS CAN BE READ WITHOUT INTERVENTION. YET GRAMMAR AND WRITING, ACTIVITIES THAT NEEDS ORGANIZATION AND STRUCTURE, TAKE MORE TIME AND THOUGHT.



IN SCIENCE AND SOCIAL STUDIES, THE STUDENTS ARE STARTING TO ASK "WHY."
"WHY DO WE NEED TO LEARN HOW TO CONVERT FROM ONE SYSTEM TO ANOTHER?" "WHY DID THE ANCIENT PEOPLE MUMMIFY THEIR PHARAOHS?" "WHY



DO WE USE BOTH PRESENT AND PAST TOGETHER IN PRESENT PERFECT TENSE?" "WHY DO WE SEE THE REFLECTED COLORS RATHER THAN THE ABSORBED ONES?" FIFTH GRADERS ARE ON THE VERGE OF CONCEPTUAL THOUGHT, AND THIS SINGLE QUESTION IS A THE ROOT OF LEARNING. THIS IS DONE WITH BOTH A YOUNG CHILD'S CURIOSITY, BUT ALSO WANTING TO PROCESS THE NOTIONS MORE DEEPLY.
