A Message from the Middle & High School Principal

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Students in grades 2 -11 are currently taking the MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) tests. We give students MAP tests to determine their instructional level and to measure academic growth throughout the school year, and from year to year. The three rests are given on different days.

Students currently take MAP assessments on a computer in the areas of Reading, Math and Language. Although the tests are not timed, it usually takes students about 75 minutes to complete each test.

MAP Assessments are given to students in the fall and spring. When taking a MAP test, the difficulty of each question is based on how well a student answers all the previous questions. As the student answers correctly, questions become more difficult. If the student answers incorrectly, the questions become easier. In an optimal test, a student answers approximately half the items correctly and half incorrectly. The final score is an estimate of the student's achievement level.

Students receive an individual score, called a RIT score. This model of assessment is based on individual growth, rather than reaching the same benchmark for each student. These tests are important to teachers because they keep track of progress and growth in basic skills. They let teachers know where a student's strengths is and if help is needed in any specific areas. The school also shares the MAP results with parents after the second semester administration of the tests. Thank you for your continued support of your child's learning.

A Message from Chelsea Meyer Grade 2 Teacher

During the AISA Conference in Johannesburg, I had the opportunity to participate in a session with Laura Benson and get some great tips and guidance on how to implement Writer's Workshop into my classroom. One of the recommendations for successful execution of Writer's Workshop, is that the teacher should model and share some of his/her own writing.

Writing for enjoyment is a beloved hobby that I seem to have lost sight of (or lost the time for) in the past few years. I haven't written as much as I would have liked to.

So, in the spirit of modeling my own creative writing for my students, as well as reviving an enjoyable practice of the past, here is an excerpt from a story idea that I have been playing around with for a few years...

The Treasure of Calico Jack By Chelsea Meyer

We got a note on the doorstep that looked very old, yet somehow familiar. It told us that there was a treasure buried in our backyard somewhere. Not an imaginary, make-believe treasure. Not a joke. A real, authentic, chest with genuine treasure inside it. It once belonged to the pirate, Calico Jack. Calico Jack was one of the most feared pirates of his time. When his dark flag with the crossed bone and sword symbol appeared, people fled the scene immediately.
