Reading and Your Child

- It is I Love To Read week at KAS! I really do love to read. Ever since I was a young child I was a voracious reader. Working in the Student Support Service division at KAS has shown me that ALL children love to be read to. ALL children love stories. Beyond the basics of reading to access the curriculum at KAS what can reading do for your child?
- Children who read often and widely get better at it. Practice makes perfect in almost everything we do, and reading in no different.
- Reading improves concentration. Children sit still and quietly when they are reading.
- Reading exercises our brain. Reading is a complex task for the brain. Reading strengthens the brains connections and builds NEW connections.
- Reading develops a child's imagination. As we read our brains translate the descriptions we read of people, places and things into pictures. While we are engaged in a story we are also imagining how a character is feeling. Children then bring this knowledge into their everyday play. Children develop empathy and deeper emotional intelligence.
- <u>Children who read achieve better in school.</u> Reading promotes achievement in all subjects. Children who are good readers tend to achieve better across the curriculum.
- <u>Linguistic Reasons.</u> The result? Improved linguistic skills in the form of a richer vocabulary, correct grammar, improved writing, better spelling and more articulate oral communication.
- <u>Connections.</u> Children who read make real world connections, text to self connections, text to text connections, and text to world connections.

What can you do as a parent?

- Read to your child
- Read around your child
- Begin collecting books for your family library (or your child's personal library)
- Purchase books from school book sales and second hand book sales
- Borrow books from our wonderful library
- Consider an e-reader or KINDLE for an older child
- Share books
- Facilitate a book club for your child
- Audio books on car trips or in the mornings on the way to school is a great way to facilitate the love of stories and broaden language.

Leila Aboulela - Famous Author Visits **KAS**



As part of the 60th Birthday Celebration Khartoum American School has had writer and alumna Leila Abdoulela as a guest. While here she met with the 11th grade African Literature class. It had, just the night before, completed reading Lyrics Alley, her only novel based in Sudan, and the students were able to converse with her about creating it, her intent with the book, and being a writer.

While she was researching the book that portrays a Sudanese writer Hassan Awad Abdoulela, a cousin of her father's, Abdoulela explored Sudan of the 1950s leading up to its Independence. During the discussion, she led the students through her journey of mixing fact with fabrication. Also, she spoke specifically about blending characters together to enhance the novel, giving examples of some of those personalities, Mahmoud and Soraya, to avoid duplicating similar traits.



Her goal for the novel was to "make the canvas bigger," referring to her exploration of how Hassan's [Nur] injury impacted those around him. Thus, she shifted the plot beyond the doomed love story to a complex examination of tragedy, its effect, and survival.


The students asked insightful questions, much to Miss Utecht and my delight.

Lastly, when asked whether she felt the need to be careful about recounting customs when writing about Sudan (Yara Saeed), Abdoulela responded, "If you can't write freely, you can't write well."
