

Letter from the Early Childhood & Elementary Principal

Dear Parents and Community Members,

It's amazing how quickly we move from the expansive freedom of our summer holiday, which lasts for several weeks, into the focused rhythm of our school year, which lasts 38 weeks, and where each school day is so structured and requires so much of the child, and where such learning and inner growth take place. Each weekend brings much needed rest and "down time," but each seems to end far too quickly. Each week-long break from school, such as our Eid al-Adha holiday which begins after school today, offers an essential respite from the intensity of focus, but these too seem to fly by. Yet as short as our weekends and week-long breaks seem to be, they offer a crucial balance to the positive stress of focused attention and learning.

It is only when we achieve real balance in our lives that health and well-being can be found. If the strings of the harp are too loose, i.e., if we are too relaxed and unfocused, or are too tight, i.e., if we are too wound up and too focused, then the song that comes from the harp will not be as beautiful, melodious, and harmonious as it could be. The harp must be finely tuned, and we must have balance in our lives. Along with order we some need disorder, the release from structure, and, as Wendell Berry writes in his classic book, "The Unsettling of America: Culture & Agriculture," "wildness":

"An enduring agriculture must never cease to consider and respect and preserve wildness. The farm can exist only within the wilderness of mystery and natural force. And if the farm is to last and remain in health, the wilderness must survive within the farm. That is what agricultural fertility is: the survival of natural process in the human order. To learn to preserve the fertility of the farm, Sir Albert Howard wrote, we must study the forest."

I wish all KAS students, families and staff members a true balance during our week off starting this afternoon, a real release from structure, some much-needed down time, and much fun and joy in family gatherings and the times with ourselves we are able to create.
