A Message from the Early Childhood & Elementary Principal

Dear Parents, Students, and Community Members,

I am sometimes asked about my philosophy of education. This began to evolve when I was a sixth-grade student. It was then that I had the first teacher I loved and revered. She was a mentor to me for several years afterward. From my experience in her class, where learning came alive, I saw that all lasting learning is grounded in love: love of teacher, love of subject, love of oneself as participant in the learning process, and love of one's peers who share in that process.

Already the following year, in seventh grade, I had my next remarkable teacher, and through him began to gather the experience necessary to comprehend the next part of my educational philosophy. His humor, wit, and understanding of the challenges we seventh graders were facing made learning fun and vulnerability possible. Enthusiasm flourished. I came to realize that true learning, learning that enlivens rather than deadens, must be accompanied by enthusiasm. If either fun or the willingness to be vulnerable are lacking in the experience of students, the breadth and depth of their potential learning will be correspondingly limited.

I grew up in a culturally-diverse community, and became aware of the implications of this especially in my high school years. Through this I realized that for education to be honest we must acknowledge the social and cultural foundations and context in which it is embedded, and which enable, enrich, and at the same time prescribe our learning opportunities and experiences. Diversity gives us the chance to break free of our cultural blind spots. In honor of this gift, genuine education doesn't just tolerate diversity, it celebrates it!

This is how my philosophy of education evolved up to the time of my becoming an adult. Next time I will share how my philosophy of education evolved in my adult years.

News in Levels (www.newsinlevels.com/)

This website writes news in three different levels of English in a way that helps students understand English. It takes them on a journey of discovery where all can enjoy reading and listening to news.

6 Minutes English

This is a BBC Learning English website and mobile app. It contains a long-running series of topical discussion and new vocabulary.

The English We Speak

Amaze your friends, impress your teachers and delight your parents with these fantastic words and phrases. This website is a great resource to catch up on the latest English words and phrases. In audio recordings of less than 3 mintues, students can stay ahead of the pack by learning the necessary phrases that they can use in their everyday conversation.

This is an online, interactive site with self-study activities and quizzes covering grammar, vocabulary, idioms, daily quotations and much more. It includes resources for teachers, students and parents as well as BBC news service links.
