The Importance of Mother Tongue Language Instruction

Mother Tongue language is a person's first or strongest language. A great amount of research in recent years has shown that children having a strong mother tongue language foundation helps them with the skills they need to learn additional languages. Children learn grammar intuitively in their mother tongue language and this is easily passed on to other languages. Multi-language importance is increasing especially in an international school like KAS. This advantage is important in a globalized world and in many organizations it is a requirement.

Mother tongue language plays a large role in the development of persona, social and cultural identity. Children with a strong foundation in mother tongue language tend to display a deep understanding of themselves and their place within the society they live in. Mother tongue development also promotes other essential skills such as critical thinking and literacy skills. Mother tongue research also shows that a strong foundation leads to a better understanding of curriculum and a more positive attitude toward school.

I attended a music workshop in Dubai last November 9-10. This was a workshop that was organized by the Association of Music Teachers in International Schools (AMIS.) In this Music educators conference I attended the following sessions.

• Fun with Folkdance

In this workshop, we explored folkdances that can be taught to all ages and make the learning more fun as the students are taught to listen to music and create dance steps. The objective of the activities was to relate music class to study different habits, costumes, and discuss the country's culture.

Moving Through Story and Song

Young children are asked to combine social expectations with learning, by moving in shared space, taking turns and participating in a thoughtful manner. We explored action songs, singing games, and stories that foster understanding of musical and movement concepts for young students.

Elephants! Music and Mindset by the keynote speaker- Michael Griffin

I bought one of his books "Children And Learning for Parents." I was really amazed how he explained how young learners achieve a higher level of achievement through motivation while considering the different factors leading to better accomplishments.

Charanga International: Vibrant, Modern Resources to Enrich Music Teaching and Learning

We explored Charanga International's comprehensive music resources, which brings together great music, modern pedagogy, and latest educational technology (this company actually got in touched with me several times, before I applied for this professional development.)

I was really amazed at the keynote speaker as he spoke about "Children and Learning." He said, "Imagine a school system that incorporated a structure where all children were asked to commit to seeking expertise in an area of their choice, as a special project alongside the traditional comprehensive education."

Students would gain a deeper understanding of the requirements to reach for the top. They would practice strategies of goal setting, monitoring, self-evaluation and reflection. They would also realize that quality and quantity of effort is the achievement game changer. The act of commitment, perseverance and resolution would build character.

Bon Berger says, "Excellence is transformational. Once the child sees what he is capable of, he is never quite the same. There is a new self-image, a new notion of possibility, a new appetite for excellence." Researches revealed that a teacher's expectations of high achievement have the greatest influence on student learning and achievement. Teachers who perceive greater potential challenge and encourage students more, teach them better, have more conversations and interact on a more matured level. For students, sensing this is powerfully motivating.

We, teachers and parents must have expectations that all students are capable of progress. Let's all have faith in our students so they may reach the fullness of their potentials. If we believe, they believe!
