Keeping Your Children Safe Using the Internet

Internet safety is very important for children—. It's about helping them use the Internet productively and ¬practice safe responsible online behavior, especially when you're not there to answer their questions or check in on where they've ventured. Keep in mind that what may seem like basic knowledge to parents is new to kids just getting started in the digital world. Having a conversation ¬before your child gets online helps set expectations and establish ground rules. Here are the basic guidelines to share with your child:

- Follow your family's rules about when and where to use the Internet.
- Be polite, kind, and respectful.
- Understand a website's rules, and know how to flag other users for misbehavior.
- Recognize "red flags," or possible danger situations including someone asking you personal questions such as your name and address.
- Never share your name, your school's name, your age, your phone number, or your email or home address with strangers.
- Never send pictures to strangers.
- Keep passwords private (except from parents).
- Never open a message from a stranger; it may contain a virus that can harm a computer.
- Immediately tell an adult if something mean or creepy happens.

Using these guidelines will help protect your children from possible harm when using the internet.

Letter from the Middle and High School Principal

Dear Students.

Exam week can be the most stressful time for a student. Ensure you're prepared for your exams with these study tips, which can help you conquer your finals.

1. Create your own study guide.

While many teachers provide a study guide, creating your own can help you understand the material better. Outlining the important information you need to learn can be helpful, both in creation and to refer to during your studies.

2. Ask questions.

Your teachers are there to help! Ask them questions regarding the material and the exam so that you're prepared when exam time arrives.

3. Pay close attention to the review sessions.

Review sessions offer vital information on exam format, what will be on the exam and key concepts you should be focusing your studies on.

4. Start early.

If you always start ahead of schedule, you'll never be cramming the night before an exam. You'll almost always perform better in doing so!

5. Organize a group study session.

It can be helpful to study in groups – sometimes. Evaluate whether or not studying with others will be beneficial in the context of the material being studied and ask yourself whether it suits your particular style of learning.

6. Study things not on the study guide.

Study guides aren't always comprehensive – they're just suggestions to guide you to the main concepts to learn. Use your study guide for its intended purpose: a guide. Be sure to fill in the blanks with related information.

7. Take breaks.

You won't be able to memorize or comprehend all the material at once. Balance is key – ensure that you reward learning with break times to recharge and relax.

8. Stay well-rested.

There's a lot to be said about a good night's sleep. Make sure you are well rested so that you can be fully focused during your exams.

9. Create a study schedule - and follow it.

Dividing the material into topics and categories with achievable goals can be very beneficial. That way, you can keep track of what you've accomplished instead of looking at the big picture and getting overwhelmed.

10. Reorganize your notes.

Evaluate and reorganize your notes into what is important, outlining important concepts, formulas dates and definitions so they're easy to understand.

11. Pace yourself.

Make sure you stay focused and don't burn yourself out. It is always wise to pace yourself rather than opting for the dreaded all-nighter. You can easily do this yourself by starting your program of study early, creating a study schedule and taking breaks when necessary!

12. Teach classmates.

Learning by teaching is a method that really works! If you work with a study buddy and explain concepts to one another, you're re-learning the material all over again. It's a great way to reinforce what you've learned and help someone in the meantime!

When something **Hangs By A Thread** it means a situation could change in an instant. The phrase alludes to the sword of Damocles that was hung from a ceiling by a single hair. The Roman philosopher Cicero tells the story that in 400 BCE Dionysius the Elder, ruler of Syracuse, became tired of one of his courtiers, Damocles, for his slimy bootlicking. To remind the young servile how fortunate his position was, and how tenuous it might be, Dionysius sat Damocles beneath the sword during a banquet. Not only did the sword 'hang by a thread' but so did Damocles's life. Cicero used the incident to illustrate that he understood how tenuous his own privileged position was.
