KAS Annual General Meeting - May 13, 2018

The KAS School Board will hold its May, 2018 Annual General Meeting on Sunday, May 13th beginning at 6:30 PM. The Board Treasurer will present a financial status report and the Superintendent will update the community on SPACIT – the KAS 5 year Strategic Plan. There will be a ballot to elect 4 members to the KAS Board starting in the 2018-19 school year. The members are elected for 2 year terms. If you would like to serve on the KAS Board please review the criteria for being a candidate for the Board.

Candidate Criteria for Parents Who Want to Serve on the KAS School Board

- 1. Candidates should request from the Superintendent a declaration form that needs to be signed and delivered to the Superintendent no later than 4 PM on Sunday, April 29th.
- 2. Attach an up-to-date Curriculum Vitae (CV).
- 3. One paragraph why you want to be on the Board.
- Must be in good financial standing all fees must be paid by May 1st.
- 5. Must Submit up-to-date CV.

Students have practical experiences and are challenged to act as Global citizens.
