### Letter from the Middle and High School Principal

Dear Parents,

MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) Spring tests will begin on Sunday, April 15, 2018. This testing season, we are really proud to announce that we are moving to **Web-based MAP** testing. Students in grades 2-11 will take the tests. These tests help our KAS teachers to determine your child's instructional level and measure academic growth throughout the school year, and from year to year in the areas of reading, mathematics and language usage.



MAP Assessments are given to students in the fall and spring. When taking a MAP test, the difficulty of each question is based on how well a student answers all the previous questions. As the student answers correctly, questions become more difficult. If the student answers incorrectly, the questions become easier. In an optimal test, a student answers approximately half the items correctly and half incorrectly. Although the tests are not timed, it usually takes students about 75 minutes to complete each test. The final score is an estimate of the student's achievement level.

MAP Growth measures what students know and informs what they're ready to learn next. By dynamically adjusting to each student's responses, MAP Growth creates a personalized assessment experience that accurately measures performance. Timely, easy-to-use reports help teachers teach, students learn, and administrators lead.

Wishing all our students a very successful MAP testing season! Have a great weekend!
