A Message from the Early Childhood & Elementary Principal

As we approach the end of the year, we have put much thought into how we are going to report student learning to give parents a clear vision of the child's learning growth and development in the dynamic learning environment that has been provided to us this year. Our goal is to provide a complete written narrative of each student. Using a narrative evaluation system is not a new idea in providing documentation of a learner's growth.

There are three major ways in which schools deliver learning growth reports.

The first is the traditional method. In this method the student receives a letter grade that correlates with a percentage such as 90% or higher is an A. If s student receives 80% to 89% they receive a B. Based on the letter grade the student is allowed to pass the course. This is a method that is used in many high schools and middle schools.

At Khartoum American School Elementary we have been using standards based assessment. We use grade level standards and outcomes to assess student achievement towards accomplishing those outcomes. For each subject there are several standards, that, when used with a scale to show proficiency towards each of those skills or standards, helps paint a good picture of that student. Many times a standards based assessment report will also include a small narrative that should complete the picture of the learner.

Due to the circumstances surrounding the end of the year, we are going to use a narrative evaluation system for the second semester report cards. Our distance learning program has allowed us to continue providing quality learning experiences but many adaptations have been made to the curriculum to meet the needs of learners. By using a narrative to report on learning, teachers will be able to provide a quality report of students' learning abilities that will allow parents understand their child's strengths and areas in need of development. It will also allow the next teacher to pick up on individual students needs. We will be using the narrative evaluation for the end of this year and plan to return to standards based assessment when we return to campus based schooling.

When someone Steals Your Thunder they are taking credit for something that you should properly be credited for. The phrase was in regular use by 1900, especially by jealous politicians claiming their brilliant and original ideas had been stolen by another. The expression was coined in the early 1700s by the playwright and critic John Dennis, who discovered the sound of thunder could be reproduced to great effect by pummelling large tin sheets backstage at the Drury Lane Theatre in London. At a time when sound effects were virtually unheard of, his idea considerably added to the drama and drew much attention. His play, on the other hand, did not attract attention and was replaced by 'Macbeth' in a matter of weeks. Shortly afterwards the embittered Dennis saw a performance of 'Macbeth' and was furious to hear his thunder being reproduced without his permission. Writing a review the following day, he raged, "See what rascals they are. They will not run my play and now they've stolen my thunder."
