## A Message from the Early Childhood & Elementary Principal

At every playground around the world children are learning how to interact and socialize with people they share interests with, and how to handle being around people they don't get along with. It is a learning experience that takes people a lifetime to perfect. Here at Khartoum American School, we believe in providing students with tools and strategies to manage their interactions with others in a positive way. We also stand by our commitment to providing a safe and friendly environment for all people in the KAS community.

Within this last month of school the elementary team has committed to providing a positive behavior intervention system to monitor and correct student behavior on the playground during recess and lunch. Creating this system has been a process that has involved many steps. The first step was to recognize the behaviors that needed to be corrected and to examine ways to address those behaviors. As a team, we all agreed that we need to be taking a role in active supervision, taking time to walk around and interact with the students during these break times and to enforce playground rules fairly and consistently.

To do this, as a team we all agreed on general playground rules that can be seen in each classroom and are reviewed before heading out to recess and lunch. The team also agreed on specific playground equipment rules. The playground was divided into four areas, and rules for each area were created. We then needed to present these rules to the students. The middle and high school student council representatives presented these rules to the students with small presentations at each area of the playground. The elementary students were also taught the consequences of not being able to follow the rules at this time.

The next step for the team is to find a way to promote the positive behaviors that we see in the classrooms and on the playground. The team collaborated and came up with a "Gotcha" certificate. This certificate is given to students when they are "caught" with behaviors that support Khartoum American School's 4 C's. When the students receive their certificates they bring them to the principal to be recognized and placed into the "Gotcha" box. At the end of each month a student's name will be drawn from this box and that student will receive a gift certificate to the KAS Trunk store.

Creating this system is an on-going process with more steps to come. In the coming months, working with the elementary counselor, we will be developing a peer mediator program. This will allow older elementary students the chance to help younger students solve problems and build relationships. As an elementary team we are dedicated to creating an environment where all people feel welcomed and safe.
